Shrubs of the Foothills

A shrub is a difficult thing to define; the term means different things to different people. Most botanists would agree however, that a shrub is a woody, perennial plant, commonly without a distinct trunk, and about two to 12 feet in height. It is not always easy to distinguish between a shrub and a small tree or between a shrub and an herb with a woody base. (Herbs are plants generally lacking woody parts above ground.)

If we use the term "shrub" very loosely and include a few local vines, we find that the foothills are home to no less than 40 species of shrubs. All are native plants except two Brooms which have come from Europe. Both French and Scotch Broom, conspicuous when in bright yellow bloom, are invasive plants with seeds that may be viable up to 70 years.

On the reverse side is a descriptive checklist of shrubs that can be found in the foothills Open Space preserves. Some shrubs listed are very rare within our boundaries, in some cases known only from one location. Thus while Bugle Currant, Chaparral Pea, Oso Berry, Pacific Ninebark, and Western Choke Cherry are listed, they are unlikely to be encountered in a casual stroll.

Chamise can form almost pure and impenetrable stands of brush that are often quite extensive. It mixes with other shrubs – Manzanita, various species of Ceanothus, Mountain Mahogany, and Scrub Oak – to form that distinct plant community of hard, woody, scrubby brush we call chaparral.

A number of native shrubs are beautiful plants when in bloom, and their colorful displays rival those of the wildflowers. In addition, every month of the year boasts at least a couple of species of shrubs in bloom. Some of the most beautiful and most unique bloom in the springtime. Blue Blossom Ceanothus, sometimes called California Mountain Lilac, puts on a showy exhibition of bluish, lilac-like blossoms.

Some shrubs are at their best in the fall or winter when in fruit rather than in flower. Thus the Toyon or Christmas Berry is weighed down by limbs drooping with dusters of bright red berries at the winter holiday season. Red, marble-sized rose hips representing the ripened fruit of the California Wild Rose are conspicuous in early fall. This plant grows in the cooler hollows. The fruit of the Holly-leaf Cherry can be gathered and eaten in the late fall, though somewhat lacking in taste. Tastier, if you can find them, are the ripened fruit of the California Blackberry found along shady stream courses.
