Spring Wildflowers of the Foothills

Springtime in the foothills means many things – streams again alive and running after winter rains, verdant hills clothed anew in rapidly growing grasses, a quickening pace of life as evidenced by the sudden appearance of birds, insects, and other wildlife, and the incomparable displays of those lovely creations of nature, the wildflowers. Spring has come when shooting stars, milk maids, and trillium appear along woodland trails and when california poppies and sky lupines flaunt their showy hues of orange and blue along roadsides and grasslands. These are but the first of scores of species of wildflowers which appear in a continuous pageant of color and fragrance over the next months. With the aid of this descriptive checklist (see reverse) and perhaps a wildflower manual and your camera, you can spend many beautiful days in these quiet foothills seeking out the wildflowers of spring.

A good many of our conspicuous wildflowers are annuals, herbs which die after blooming but produce seed that germinate the following season. Most annuals begin growth in winter, bloom in spring, and die in summer, having lived about six months or less. Perennial herbs also die back after blooming but, in addition to bearing seeds, reappear the next season from underground roots, stems, and bulbs. Unlike the herbs, the trees and shrubs possess woody upper parts which persist throughout the year. Unlike the herbs, most woody plants bloom in spring. Some, such as the blue blossom ceanothus and silk tassel bush, are remarkably attractive, and for that reason a few have been included in this list of wildflowers even though we generally think of wildflowers as smaller herbs.

Some wildflowers are quite versatile in their ability to grow in varied environments and habitats. For example, the common star lily blooms February through June in woodland, chaparral, and grassland. Other wildflowers are not so versatile and, as a result, are harder to find. The most rare flowers must be sought out in their secret haunts. To the admirer of wildflowers these are the real prizes: the floral hermits, such as mission bells, columbine, and coral root orchid, are all inhabitants of cool niches in shady woodlands.

Many weeds have become naturalized locally. Some are attractive and pose little threat to the native flora. Sweet alyssum, mustard, and filaree clothe and brighten roadsides and disturbed areas where the natural ecology has been upset. Others like the poison hemlock, Italian thistle and yellow starthistle are noxious pests which invade disturbed areas, persist, and continue to spread. They disrupt the native flora and give an otherwise natural scene a waste lot appearance.

The identification of wildflowers is not difficult and can become a lifelong source of pleasure. Many foothills wildflowers can be identified by a process of elimination using this checklist and relating the flower you have found to the factors listed.
