
6. Briefly describe the present physical appearance of the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:

The very narrow entrance provides access to the theater proper in the interior of the black—a standard arrangement for preserving profitable street-front commercial space. As was common for theaters of the *twenties, this is a mixture of wide-ranging decorative motifs. Some alterations have accurred at the street level.
