Literacy & Learning Events

Children's Events:

- April 15: Youth Services Librarian Maggie Lai led the STEAM Lab Sunday at Mitchell Park: The 3 Little Pigs Challenge. 35 people came to build houses made of craft supplies. The Big Bad Wolf made an appearance with his hairdryer and Maggie is pleased to say that all houses were built to stand up to his huffing and puffing.
- April 14: Senior Librarian Melissa Morwood presented the monthly Family Film Festival program, featuring the movie "Hotel Transylvania," at Mitchell Park. 37 people (kids, parents, and grandparents) attended the program. Add 1-3 sentences

- April 25: Librarian Kathy Swartz ran an Afternoon Adventures event at Children's Library. 20 attendees including 17 kids from Kindergarten through 5th grade attended. The children drew comic strips (or other drawings), incorporating plastic bread clips as characters or other elements of the story.



Teen Events:

 April 3 & 5: Teen Services Librarian, Gina Feil and TLAB, had spring break activities at Mitchell Park Library where 24 teens created terrariums while watching My Neighbor Totoro, and 24 teens competed for the best cupcake design in Cupcake Wars while we watched Coco. Teens expressed that the terrariums was a relaxing activity, especially with everything going on in the news lately, and at their school. Teens also were curious about Raspberry Pi on their succulent plants, and Dan Lou demonstrated how to play music touching petals which teens said was cool.





Adult Events:

- April 28: Librarian Camden Kimura presented Family Storytime at Mitchell Park Library to 55 children and caregivers. A caregiver thoughtfully gave her cough drops before the storytime started, following Camden losing her voice in the middle of storytime the previous week.
- April 29: Senior Librarian, Dan Lou, presented "Coding with the Robot Workshop 1: Meet Dewey" at Mitchell
 Park. 20 customers (tweens, teens, adults) attended the program on introduction to Choregraphe and how to
 write a basic application for Dewey. The workshop was very well received. One customer said that it is a wellorganized one and we have a good team, another customer loved it so much that she said she would hire Dan.

- April 14: Librarians Christine Pennington and Camden Kimura set up a library table at the Great Race for Saving
 Water event hosted by the city. There were hundreds of attendees that were racing, tabling, or just there to get
 out into the community. Along with two volunteers, the library featured recycled crafts of black out poetry and
 book mark making with old and damaged books.

Adult Events:

- April 15: Senior Librarian, Rebecca Kohn, hosted a poetry drop-in as part of the Spring Family Day event with the Art Center. Participants enjoyed playing with the Paint Chip Poetry game to create their own poems and decorating poems. During the month of April, Rebecca also organized a book display for National Poetry Month at Rinconada. She worked with teen volunteers to create a bulletin board full of poems (photo below).
- April 27: Senior Librarian Alison de Geus and Christine hosted the Teen & Adult Craft Night at Rinconada Library.
 We had 15 attendees, many of whom have become program regulars since we started in January. Participants created works of String Art, and seemed to enjoy the opportunity to hammer some nails. They also welcomed some new faces in April, and it's been exciting to see this program take off!
