22 Chair Arthur called the meeting to order.

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24 Mr. Coles called roll.

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34 Mr. Joye stated there were a couple motions at the May meeting but he does not see any text 35

related to them and asked where it is recorded for the record.

- 37 Mr. Coles noted that exact motions do not show up in the minutes. If there was a motion, Chair
- 38 Arthur would send the motion to City Council in most cases. The motions can be included in the
- minutes if the Committee wishes. 39
- 40 Chair Arthur noted that he has started cc'ing the Committee when he sends them to City Council.
- 41 Mr. Joye commented that it is not a huge deal if there is a place to find them, but he thinks it
- 42 would be appropriate to include them in the minutes.

- 1 Chair Arthur agreed.
- 2 Mr. Joye moved to approve the minutes for May and June, seconded by Mr. Beaujardiere.
- 3 Approval of the minutes passed unanimously.

4 4. PUBLIC COMMENTS

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9 There were no public comments.

10 5. STAFF UPDATES

a. Office of Transportation Staffing Updates (Sylvia Star-Lack, OOT) 6:25 PM

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Ms. Star-Lack announced that she recruited Katie Heuser as a senior transportation planner for the S/CAP (Sustainability and Climate Action Plan) planner role, which is a full-time position.

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16 Ms. Rosten questioned where the job had been posted.

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Ms. Star-Lack answered that HR had posted it on Government Jobs and Palo Alto's website, and she thought it had been sent to NACTO and APA.

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21 Chair Arthur inquired if Ms. Hauser would join the meeting next month for an introduction.

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23 Ms. Star-Lack stated she will ask her.

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25 Ms. Rosten asked how this will make her job easier.

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Ms. Star-Lack stated it is great to not have projects stuck. She hopes the South Palo Alto Bikeway, for example, will advance with Ms. Heuser's employment.

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- b. Caltrans El Camino Real Bikeway Project (*Charlie Coles, OOT*) 6:30 PM
- i. Please review Council Staff Report from June 17, 2024 (Agenda Item 31).
 - ii. Please review <u>Council Action Minutes from June 18, 2024 (Action Item AA4)</u>.

- 35 Mr. Coles expressed that the agenda packet includes links to the June 17 Council Staff Report 36 and the Council Action Minutes and Motion that passed on June 18. The staff reports provide an 37 overview of the completed work since the April 1 Council motion. He outlined the several
- attachments that are included, which provide project details. On June 18, Council passed a
- resolution to remove parking on El Camino Real, which allows Caltrans to proceed with their
- 40 repaving and bikeway project. Since then, staff has been coordinating on a number of items with
- PABAC, the Ad Hoc, Caltrans, Fehr & Peers, and various stakeholders to advance Council's
- 42 motion. He remarked that a lot of progress has been made, particularly in June, and there has
- been a lot of discussion with Caltrans. Part of Council's motion was to submit a response to the

- Fehr & Peers Review Memo and Joint City/VTA Memo, and Caltrans submitted the response 1
- 2 and followed up with revised plans, which include the revised bikeway and signage plans. Staff
- 3 had reviewed the documents, and a few major changes include bike/bus only markings and the
- 4 class 4 bike facilities, which he detailed. There are minor changes to "Sharrow" markings, bike
- 5 boxes, and the two-stage turn queue boxes at various locations. The parking lane is to be retained
- 6 southbound on El Camino Real between the Medical Foundation and Embarcadero. There has
- 7 also been some fine-tuning of the Quarry Road intersection and the Sand Hill Road Palo Alto
- 8 Avenue intersection.

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Chair Arthur queried if there will be parking on El Camino next to a large parking lot.

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12 Mr. Coles replied it will be on the southbound approach of El Camino Real, so the opposite side.

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- 14 Ms. Star-Lack added that in the northbound direction the bike lane stops at Encina and folks will
- 15 be directed to Encina to the Caltrain path and from Encina until Quarry there will not be a
- northbound bike lane. She explained why it has always been that way in the plan. She discussed 16
- 17 there being off-street parallel routes.

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- 19 Mr. Joye asked if the at-grade bridge going over the underpass at the exit on El Camino after
- 20 passing the Palo Alto Medical Foundation and the hotels is the jurisdiction of Caltrans or the
- 21 City.

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23 Ms. Star-Lack answered that the bridge is Caltrans' jurisdiction..

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- 25 Mr. Wachtel has reservations about the process of how the project has been conducted. He feels
- 26 that PABAC has had little opportunity to comment on most of the changes the City requested
- 27 from Caltrans. There was a letter from the City Manager in November that requested changes
- 28 that had not been reviewed with PABAC either before or after. PABAC had an opportunity to
- 29 comment to the Council Ad Hoc Committee only because that Committee requested it. PABAC
- 30 had a meeting on June 4 and Fehr & Peers issued a memo, which was apparently transmitted to 31 Caltrans, and PABAC did not have an opportunity to review the memo. He is disappointed that
- 32 PABAC has been consistently left out of the process. He wonders why PABAC has not been 33 consulted on the major changes made in the last version of the plans.

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- 35 Ms. Star-Lack voiced that staff has been working as hard as possible with the limited time and 36
 - deadlines they have been given by Caltrans. They consulted PABAC when they felt they had
 - 37 time.

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39 Mr. Liberman asked if there is a bikeway connection between Encina and Caltrans and if there 40 are to be improvements.

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- 42 Ms. Star-Lack responded that Encina is basically a cul-de-sac without much traffic. They have
- 43 not considered putting bike lanes there. On-street parking would have to be removed to do that,
- 44 which she does not think businesses will accept.

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46 Mr. Liberman asked if the alternative is for bicyclists to take Embarcadero. Chair Arthur replied that Encino ends with an access point to the Caltrain Bike Path.

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Mr. Goldstein apologized for arriving late. He asked if the official designation is the Caltrain path or the Embarcadero path. It is different in different documents.

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Mr. Coles responded that several PABAC members suggested that Caltrain Bike Path be the recognizable name, so the official name will be the Caltrans Bike Path. On Google Maps and elsewhere, it is titled the Embarcadero Bike Path. City Staff submitted a request to Google Maps to change the Embarcadero Bike Path to Caltrain Bike Path. The updated name will be incorporated into other maps over time, including on maps prepared for the Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan Update.

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Mr. Goldstein concurs with Mr. Wachtel's comments. He feels that PABAC is often not consulted about important issues. If there had not been a meeting, an Ad Hoc meeting could have been scheduled, which would have given PABAC an opportunity to comment. He is happy that City Council made a decision, regardless of whether he totally concurs with the decision, and that Caltrans will do the paving. He thinks it was a sensible way to proceed.

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Mr. Joye inquired when and where the repaying will start.

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Mr. Coles answered that last week Caltrans posted their traffic advisory and staff is in the process of adding it to the City's project website. The traffic advisory is available on the Caltrans project website and it provides some specific dates. He discussed what Caltrans will be starting pot hole repair work on August 19. The repaying work will start on September 3, and staff has been told it will start in Palo Alto and move from north to south, and parking will be removed.

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Mr. Liberman stated that Caltrans has already started some pedestrian-related activity, and he inquired if the pedestrian activities will be included on the website or how pedestrians will be informed of the activities.

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Mr. Coles answered that the curb work and ADA work has been ongoing and Caltrans has been providing three-week look-ahead schedules. Staff will speak with Caltrans about making the information available to the public. He remarked that it is not written in layman's terms.

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Ms. Star-Lack thinks Caltrans provides notice if sidewalks are to be closed.

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- Mr. Coles provided an update on the bicycle wayfinding signage work. He thanked everyone who had provided input, which was very helpful. There seems to be consensus amongst PABAC on the proposed wayfinding signage, which Caltrans was asked to include. He summarized that PABAC identified a need for wayfinding and a desire to follow best practices. There were suggestions to focus on destinations and parallel routes to El Camino Real and suggestions to include distances on the signage. Staff had also received conflicting comments, which included exact wayfinding and what labels to include in terms of roadway names or key destinations. As
- 43
- 44 part of the plan proposed to Caltrans, staff prioritized the parallel routes and wayfinding signage
- 45 for the Stanford Perimeter Trail, Caltrain Bike Path, Bike-Ped Bridge to Menlo Park, Palo Alto
- Caltrain Station, Palo Alto Transit Center, California Avenue Caltrain Station, California Avenue 46

- 1 Underpass, and the Wilkie Way Bridge. Staff realizes there is a need and a desire to do a more
- 2 comprehensive look at bicycle wayfinding signage that will go beyond just El Camino Real, so it
- 3 will be a future action item following the City's Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan
- 4 Update. They had received feedback from PABAC regarding making information more readily
- 5 available for the project, so a new project webpage has been created specifically for this Caltrans
- 6 El Camino Real project cityofpaloalto.org/ecrpavementproject. He asked to be contacted by email if anyone has any questions about the project.

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Mr. Beaujardiere asked if the construction schedule dates will be updated with the newly received information.

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Mr. Coles hopes the new information will be posted shortly. It is currently going through the review process. He will let PABAC know when the updates are available.

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c. Southern Palo Alto Bicycle and Pedestrian Railroad Crossing Study Updates in addition to the grade separation work (*Charlie Coles, OOT*) 7:00 PM

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i. Purpose of study is to identify locations and develop design concepts for up to two (2) new bicycle and pedestrian grade-separated crossings of the Caltrain corridor (and Alma Street, if needed) in Southern Palo Alto (i.e., south of Oregon Expressway).

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ii. Please review <u>Request for Proposal (RFP 191297)</u> for more information, including proposed scope of work and study area location.

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Mr. Coles noted that the agenda packet contains a brief description of the ultimate goal of the study. There is also a link to the RFP, which includes the proposed scope of work and the study area location. They have identified a consultant, and they have been notified of the intent to award a contract. They are working through the process to finalize the contract, which they hoped to finish in a week or two, and then it will go to Council for approval. The goal is to start the project in September.

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Ms. Ellson expressed that she could not get into the proposal content of the RFP.

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33 Mr. Coles explained how to access the RFP.

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Mr. Goldstein noted that he also had difficulty accessing the proposal content, but the scope of work is the important information to review.

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Mr. Wachtel added that it is important to review the scope of work and the budget of \$500K for the consultants.

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Mr. Liberman queried if this is connected with the Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan 42 Update or how it will be connected.

- 44 Mr. Coles answered that it is connected and they still need to determine how the two will merge.
- 45 This study and the Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan Update will inform one another.
- When the Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan Update is wrapping up, the locations for

the two new crossings will need to be identified and then this study will get into more details on design concepts, etc. d. Joint PABAC meeting with City of Mountain View Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) on Wednesday, August 28, 2024 at 6:30 PM (Charlie Coles, OOT7:15 PM i. Please review **Attachment 1** for overview of BPAC meeting process. Mr. Coles provided a presentation concerning key updates related to the August 28 meeting with Mountain View BPAC, which included general information about the meeting, its purpose, overall agenda. PABAC members will join virtually, and he will share the link when he has it. PABAC members should have a calendar invite. He asked Committee members to notify him if it has not been received. He outlined the process and restrictions for Brown Act compliance. There will be a presentation from the County of Santa Clara to provide an overview of the county's Bike Plan update, and there will be an opportunity for feedback. As Mountain View takes notes on the comments, they requested that comments be made in one paragraph or one dialogue. Mr. Joye mentioned that he received a message from Mountain View staff today with a personalized Zoom link. He inquired if Mountain View staff wants comments to be written or if comments should be voiced in a succinct way. Mr. Coles answered that all comments should be in a clear and coherent verbal paragraph. He added that he has also received a personalized Zoom link, which is where PABAC members will join the meeting. Vice Chair Nordman asked if PABAC will be considered Committee members or members of the public. Mr. Coles understood that PABAC will be considered Committee members. Ms. Star-Lack confirmed PABAC will be considered Committee members. Ms. Rosten questioned if the meeting will last about three hours and what information from PABAC will be most valuable to them. Mr. Coles thought the length of the meeting will be known once the agenda is put together by Mountain View staff. Originally there was a strong desire for BPAC to learn about Safe Routes to School, however, the Safe Routes to School topic has been removed from the agenda. Mountain View is interested in discussing connectivity between Mountain View and Palo Alto, so San Antonio Road will be a major topic and El Camino Real could be another. The agenda

will include a list of potential topics to allow for openness in the discussion between Mountain

View and Palo Alto.

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- 1 Ms. Ellson questioned if Palo Alto will be submitting anything to Mountain View for agenda
- 2 items, questions, etc. She asked if this is Mountain View's meeting and if Palo Alto will be a 3 guest.

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- 5 Mr. Coles answered that it is a joint meeting. It is effectively BPAC's meeting and PABAC has
- 6 been asked to join, but it structured to be beneficial to both cities and both committees. The
- 7 meeting was originally scheduled for a couple months ago, and staff had requested agenda items
- 8 from PABAC for the meeting. PABAC provided a lot of input and those topics were shared with
- 9 Mountain View and have been incorporated into the agenda.

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Chair Arthur asked if the meeting will be virtual for everyone or just for PABAC.

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Mr. Coles replied that it will be virtual PABAC members and members of the public.

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Mr. Liberman remembered from a previous meeting that Mountain View was very interested in knowing what would be done about Middlefield as a connection.

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7:30 PM e. San Antonio Road Area Plan (*Charlie Coles, OOT*)

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- The San Antonio Road Area Plan (Area Plan) aims to establish goals, policies, and implementation programs for land use, transportation, critical infrastructure and other improvements that will support the redevelopment of
- the area surrounding San Antonio Road.

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Please review Request for Proposal (RFP 191402) for more information, including proposed scope of work and plan area boundary (see Addendum #2).

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Mr. Coles noted that the main goal for this area plan is summarized in the agenda packet. There is a link to the RFP. At the previous meeting, there was a question on the actual area plan boundary, so he displayed a slide showing that, and he explained how the committee could download this information.

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Mr. Joye noticed that in the RFP document there is a list of relevant policy documents, and he is surprised to see the Cal Poly concept plan listed. He questioned who made that decision.

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Mr. Coles explained staff wanted to make consultants aware of the previous Cal Poly work partly because it included some level of community engagement, so they want the consultants to be aware of that work and the conversations that have already occurred.

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39 Ms. Star-Lack added that Planning attached that as a resource for the reasons Mr. Coles spoke of.

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41 Chair Arthur asked if this is only a request for a consultant to put together a plan for San Antonio 42 with no more ambitions or proposals.

- 44 Mr. Coles confirmed that is an accurate read of the scope of work. The scope of work in the RFP
- 45 is an opportunity for a city or agency to communicate to consultants the work desired and is a

guideline. The consultants are to take the request and produce a more detailed scope of work for their contract.

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4 Ms. Ellson wants reassurance that Cubberley will be part of the connection to the new neighborhoods.

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Ms. Star-Lack replied that Cubberley is on the map. She complimented Mr. Coles for his work in his writeup related to how this plan must connect the new community to the local resources, and the plan is going to add resources or will connect people to existing resources.

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11 Ms. Ellson thanked Mr. Coles for that. She stated it is critically important.

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13 Mr. Wachtel asked if there is a budget in the RFP.

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Mr. Coles replied that the budget is not posted in the RFP. They will be asking consultants to advise on what they believe the appropriate budget should be.

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Mr. Joye asked if the Housing Element opportunity sites on the map were done by the Housing Element Working Group. He voiced that some of them within the boundary seem odd.

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Ms. Star-Lack responded that the map was generated by Planning, and whatever is in the Housing Element has been reflected on the map. The Citizens Advisory Group, Planning Commission, and Counsel approved all the sites.

Mr. Joye inquired if the gas station will be converted into a housing location, which is striking to him.

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Ms. Star-Lack answered that just because it is on there does not mean it will necessarily happen.

Chair Arthur does not think Ms. Star-Lack and Mr. Coles are the ones to respond to that question.

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33 Mr. Joye is hoping to get insight into how the map was created.

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Chair Arthur voiced that it sounds like the result of the Housing Element that has been submitted to the State. He understands that the colors on the map have been proposed by the City but not yet approved by the State.

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39 Mr. Joye thanked Chair Arthur for his input.

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Chair Arthur added that a lot of things in the Housing Plan are currently occupied by something else and that that is quite common.

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Ms. Rodia asked what the time horizon is around the plan that consultants are being asked to make and when the plan will be implemented.

Mr. Coles clarified that there is a distinction between when the plan will be implemented and when it will be finished. Area plans usually have 20-year horizons, maybe less. He does not know if that has been specified as part of this document. The anticipated timeline for completion of the plan is between 24 and 30 months.

Ms. Ellson presumes the high-density housing currently being built will be occupied as soon as it is built. She queried if it will be three years before there are connections to the train station, community services, and schools and why the transportation planning is so far behind for this part of town.

Ms. Star-Lack replied this is a land-use and transportation plan, so she is confused by Ms. Ellson's question. The housing sites have been identified, but the plan is to figure out not just transportation but all the other amenities, resources, etc., needed to have a healthy neighborhood. The plan will identify either there needing to be a grocery store, etc., or if there will be connections to existing nearby establishments. She voiced that she cannot answer why things are behind. She feels that the South Palo Alto work is getting a lot of attention.

 Ms. Ellson commented that the project approvals for the Charleston and Arastradero Plan did not proceed the mitigation planning (they were done simultaneously), and a nexus study was done in advance, which helped fund the mitigations. She considered the scale of this development to be more than triple what happened on Charleston. She does not see the same level of planning being done, which disturbs her.

Ms. Star-Lack responded that it is a different planning environment.

Chair Arthur stated this is a lot of material that he will have to read through.



DIRECTION FROM CITY COUNCIL – 11/6/23

- Maintain California Avenue as a car-free street with current areas of street closure to be made permanent.
- Pedestrian traffic be directed to the sidewalks to increase visibility of retailers.

PEDESTRIAN & BICYCLE CO-EXISTENCE - CHALLENGES

The design requirements have many contradictions:

- Slow, two-way bike lane (dedicated lanes are for efficient, not slow travel)
- A car free street yet service vehicles every week for the farmers' market
- Co-locating a two-way bike lane and emergency vehicle induces higher bike speeds
- Ease of customer access to Farmers' market stalls limits how to separate bikes and pedestrians

E MEADOW DRIVE / ROSS ROAD DISCUSSION

Overview

- Councilmembers have been contacted regarding a petition (300+ signatures) for a 4-way stop at the Ross/Meadow traffic circle.
- Ross/Meadow intersection was previously a 4-way stop, then reconstructed as a roundabout, then subsequently converted (with Council approval) to the current 2way stop traffic circle (or neighborhood traffic circle) to give preference to the Ross Bike Boulevard.
- Transportation Staff reviewed the traffic circle within the past year and do not recommend changes to the current traffic control.
- In the past 5 years, there has been one minor damage/minor injury collision.
- Staff is requesting input on traffic circle operations from PABAC.



Safe Traffic Signals for Bicycles: El Camino Real in Palo Alto

September 3, 2024 PABAC Meeting

What

Improve El Camino Real traffic signal safety for bicycles with reliable bike detection and appropriately timed signal phases for bicycle speeds.

Why

Many ECR traffic signals at intersections with bicycle routes do not detect bicycles, forcing cyclists to ride on the sidewalk, dismount their bicycles to push a pedestrian button, or wait longer at intersections than motor vehicles. Caltrans has been unresponsive to requests from bicyclists to repair non-functional bike detection at Caltrans traffic signals on ECR. Additionally, the amber signal phase, and sometimes the green signal phase, is often too short for bicycles to safely clear ECR's large intersections.

How

PABAC members (or a subcommittee) will audit traffic signals and compile a report for city staff. In turn, city staff will advocate and collaborate with Caltrans to repair or improve existing infrastructure. The audit will determine which lanes and desired movements through the intersection have bicycle detection, and measure minimum signal phase times for amber and green signals.

Why Now

With bicycle lane striping installation on ECR beginning this fall, it is a good time to make related safety improvements for bicycle transportation along and across the ECR corridor. Since Caltrans is actively engaged in a bicycle-related project, we might get more traction from Caltrans now.

Open Questions

- 1. Does Palo Alto city staff have resourcing and interest to work with PABAC and Caltrans to advocate for and implement proposed traffic signal repairs and improvements?
- 2. What should be the scope of the traffic signal audit?
 - a. All ECR signalized intersections or only bike route intersections?
 - b. Bicycles crossing ECR or turning onto ECR? Also bicycles on ECR bike lanes? ECR left turn lanes?
 - c. Bicycle detection only? Also signal phase timing?
 - d. Should pedestrian infrastructure also be included, e.g., checking function of pedestrian crosswalk buttons?
- 3. Does Caltrans plan to install bicycle detection for bicycles riding in new ECR bicycle lanes as part of the repaving project?

Hi City Council Members, City Manager and others,

Last September I sent you all a video of cars illegally parked on El Camino Way in the bike lane with kids forced into the travel lane with cars going in both directions endangering them and other bike riders. Since then, the City has trimmed trees so that the no parking signs could be seen and they have done some enforcement.

As of today and even months earlier, this has had little or no effect on the problem here, see video below. Just a few days ago, I went by and there were three cop cars parked on the east side and four cars illegally parked on the west side. Enforcement is not working! No one is paying any attention/flaunting the no parking here. Even the cops as they were there for some other reason.

On Sept 3rd, the repaving effort of El Camino will start and there will be no parking on El Camino. Thank you to Council and the Ad-hock committee for making bike lanes possible

here. However, this will make the situation much worse on El Camino Way since the cars that were parking on El Camino, will now park on El Camino Way.

It is time to take the next step here and paint the bike lane green so that people will really see that they are parking in a bike lane. This should have been done six months ago followed by more enforcement. The good news is that this could happen pretty quickly if the City is serious about the safety of our school kids. The City could also lower the no parking signs so that they are easier for drivers in their cars to see.

The parking on El Camino Way will always be a problem since the Palo Alto Commons does not have enough parking. The longer term solution might be to make El Camino Way a oneway, one-lane street with parking on both sides and well marked bike lanes in each direction. While this would solve the parking issue, you would still have lots of people crossing the street from the parking on the west side to get to the Palo Alto Commons.

Council, please direct staff to paint the bike lane green ASAP to safe guard our school kids and also direct staff to look into a longer term solution for this area.

> I am writing you to inform you of a very dangerous situation that needs fixing ASAP - yesterday! I have submitted this to PA 311 many months ago and had no response. I talked to the PA police department a few months ago (National night out) and the one individual I talked to had not even heard of PA 311. At his suggestion I file a police report on this about a week later.

> Later on, I actually did see a police officer ticketing people in this area. The problem is, the trees hide the no parking signs that are there and people keep parking there anyway.

> Today I was riding by and captured this video (see attached): three cars illegally parked in the bike lane and young riders having to go around them while cars are coming in both directions. This will likely be a terrible crash with all the traffic in this area and a very sad story as the city will have to explain to someone's parents why they did not do enough to avoid this when it was

brought to their attention through all the normal channels many months ago.

> I think the actions to be taken to prevent such a potential tragedy is to post no parking signs on the trees at no higher then 6 feet so that they can be seen. Right now the trees keep the signs from being seen. With signs on every tree trunk, at eye level, this could really make a difference. This would only be about three additional signs, a very small price to pay to keep our school kids safe.
