Wet Your Whistle, Not the Recycling. While it may be healthy for you to be well hydrated, liquids and food can ruin the recycling. Make sure you're Recycle-Ready: pour out liquids, scrape out food, and wipe out oily or sticky residue. Bottles and containers need to be empty of food and liquid. Don't rush to flush! Avoid flushing anything down your toilet except toilet paper and human waste. Flushing other items, such as sanitary pads, wipes, or diapers, causes sewer backups into homes and streets, and can contribute to pollution in creeks and the San Francisco Bay. In recent years, wildfires have intensified in California, and utilities are taking action to reduce fire risks related to utility infrastructure. During extreme weather events, a utility may shut off power to electric lines in high threat areas to prevent wildfire. This is called a public safety power shutoff, or PSPS. The City of Palo Alto Utilities (CPAU) has a wildfire mitigation plan that outlines activities by CPAU and other City departments to mitigate the threat of wildfires associated with overhead electric lines and associated equipment. Hold on to those balloons! Did you know that metallic foil, or Mylar, balloons are a major cause of power outages? Mylar balloons can explode and catch fire when coming in contact with power lines, creating a dangerous situation.
