- 18 <u>Chair Summa:</u> I see that there are none so we will then move onto the City official reports,
- 19 please.

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City Official Reports

2 1. Directors Report, Meeting Schedule and Assignments

3 Mr. Jonathan Lait, Director of Planning and Development Services: Great, thank you Chair

Summa, and good evening Planning and Transportation Commissioners. Jonathan Lait, Director

for Planning and Development Services. Just a few items to report from Planning and then

Sylvia's got a couple of announcements for the Office of Transportation.

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8 Just wanted to share with the Commission that last Monday the City Council had a discussion

on the Parklet Program Standards. We received some good feedback on some additional

changes that we need to make for that program and we're currently working on addressing

those and we'll return to the Council as soon as we are able.

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On May 1st the City Council will be taking up the appeal or of the 2147 Yale Street project that I

believe the Commission had looked at and made a recommendation to deny the applicant's

request for a Parcel Map Exception.

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On May 8th I believe we have on your... we have reached out to you to reserve that date for a

possible joint session with the City Council where you would be receiving the Housing Element

that will be revised based on some feedback that we've recently receive from HCD. And we

would anticipate that being a joint session, the Planning and Transportation Commission would

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1 first consider that document and make a recommendation to the City Council that evening. And

2 then the City Council will continue to deliberate and decide what they want to do with the

3 Housing... the revised Housing Element.

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5 Let's see, in other news, there is a community meeting on March 30th from 5:30 to 6:30 where

the City's going to share some information and receive feedback on a proposed Rental Registry

Program that we are currently working on. That is online and information is available on the

City of Palo Alto website at a number of places but also the calendar. If you look to that you can

get some information.

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Let's see, the Bona Vista Mobil Home Park, we anticipate or there's going to be some Town

Halls with residents and as they continue to refine their concepts and create a redevelopment

plan for that area. Information again is also available on the City's website for that.

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And then lastly is just a note that in the next coming months that we would expect Palo Alto

HomeKey, this is the transitional housing project. We would expect some revised plans being

presented to the City Council and some further direction provided to hopefully advance that

project as soon as we can. So, that will conclude the planning-related remarks and I'll turn it

over to Sylvia Star-Lack.

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Ms. Sylvia Star-Lack, Transportation Planning Manager: Good evening, Commissioners. I'm Sylvia Star-Lack, Transportation Planning Manager for the City in the Office of Transportation. I have two updates for you. The first is that May is bike month and Bike to Work Day is just around the corner on Thursday, May 18th. The fun continues with Bike to Where Ever Days on Friday and Saturday, May 19th and 20th. With more fun events and energizer stations for riders in Santa Clara and San Mateo Counties. Our local volunteers are running three energizer stations the morning of May 18th. One at City Hall Plaza, one at the California Avenue Caltrain Plaza, and one at the Wilkie Way Bridge on Miller Avenue. More information can be found at the Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalitions Bike to Where Ever Days website and at the forthcoming City's Bike to Work Day website.

Second item is an update about our recently launched Palo Alto Link, on-demand transit service. Our... it's our on demand corner to corner ride-sharing service. Since it launched on March 7th, we've provided 2,473 rides to folks. This is as of yesterday and here's a run down of other metrics up through yesterday that you might be interested in. 3,627 accounts were created in the app for the Palo Alto Link, we have had 728 unique active riders, we've... let's see, the ride... the average ride duration is 13.7 minutes, the average ride distance is 3.3 miles, the average ride rating out of five is 4.8, the average pick up walking distance because is it a corner to corner service is 120 meters and I did the math. It's 131 yards or less than 400-feet and the average pick-up estimated time of arrival is 14.4 minutes. So, that's all I have.

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3 Commissioner Templeton.

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5 Commissioner Templeton: Thank you. I was really excited about this program, I'm glad to hear

it's doing really well. I had a feature that wasn't working as expected that I wanted to share

with you. I downloaded it on a Friday I think after work or after the hours of the program and it

reminded me all weekend why haven't you taken a ride yet and I'm like because the hours

aren't there. So, I would say maybe sync your notifications with the hours window but I did see

my first Palo Alto Link ride in the wild today over by Gunn High School. So, I hear it's going well

11 so great, congratulations.

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Chair Summa: Anyone else?

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15 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Director Lait, the HomeKey project revisions that you're expecting to

come in. Do you know if that project is going to be shrinking or getting larger or are the changes

really not related to capacity?

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Mr. Lait: I believe the capacity is still about the same. I think there's some other changes that

are being considered to that address the community room space and some other areas that...

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1	and there might be a slight site plan configuration, but it's, for the most part, it's what you
2	would expect.
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4	Commissioner Templeton: Director Lait, I noticed that the Packet doesn't have the 5/8 date in
5	here for the PTC meeting. Do we want to include that in the future (interrupted)
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7	Mr. Lait: I'm sorry I missed (interrupted)
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9	<u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Dates.
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11	Mr. Lait: It doesn't have future dates?
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13	Commissioner Templeton: Packet Page 5. I don't know if that's something just to yeah, just to
14	keep some visibility up because (interrupted)
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16	Mr. Lait: Oh, it looks like it may have been cut off from the production. Veronica, could we take
17	a look at that and redistribute to the Commission? Thank you.
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19	Commissioner Templeton: Thank you and then the other question I had for Ms. Star-Lack was
20	have we planned a study session for transportation to talk to us about El Camino and what's

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1	happening to it? We've been asking three or four meetings in a row to see if we can coordinate
2	that with transportation.
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4	Ms. Star-Lack: So, we have not planned one. I can talk tonight at some point if you would like
5	just about what's happening on El Camino.
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7	Commissioner Templeton: Yeah, that would be great, but I don't know if we want to Agendize it
8	do people can hear it.
9	
10	Ms. Star-Lack: Yeah, I don't know what the right protocol is but.
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12	Commissioner Templeton: Okay.
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14	Mr. Lait: I think your next item is talking about the Work Plan and so to the extent, there's some
15	interest in the Commission to know more about (interrupted)
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17	Commissioner Templeton: I like it, let's do that, thank you.
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19	Ms. Star-Lack: Thanks.
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1	Commissioner Reckdahl: Yeah, a follow-up on the HomeKey project, do we have any estimate
2	of when it's going to start and when construction start and when it would finish?
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4	Mr. Lait: You know, I think they're fine-tuning some of that so I wouldn't want to speak now
5	and get that something completely wrong but I believe that's part of the update that will be
6	forthcoming.
7	
8	Commissioner Reckdahl: Thank you.
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10	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang].
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12	Vice-Chair Chang: Question for Mr. Lait, we got a public comment from a bunch of Ellsworth
13	Place residents, and just because we were copied on it. And I was just wondering if you knew
14	anything about what was going on because it was regarding supposed alleged Code violations
15	and code enforcement.
16	
17	Mr. Lait: Thank you for the opportunity and I wasn't able to get a response out to the emailer
18	today but I will endeavor to make sure that that happens tomorrow. We had actually we've
19	been talking about that. The one complaint that I was aware of was the chain link fence and so
20	we'll follow-up with code enforcement action and have that addressed. And then there was
	

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1	another comment about a pile of dirt and some wood stakes that had been collected. So, we're
2	going to take a look at that and if that's out there then we will seek to have that remedied as
3	well.
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5	Vice-Chair Chang: There was also a question about a tree.
6	
7	Mr. Lait: I think the tree is a prior comment unless I'm mistake. I think that was something a
8	concern about a tree that was cut down last year or sometime before. And I believe the Staff
9	analysis on that the conclusion was that the tree itself was not a protected tree at the time that
10	it was cut down because it was during it was for the last under the last set of regulations
11	that apply to protected trees.
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13	Vice-Chair Chang: Thank you.
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15	Mr. Lait: Sure.
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17	Vice-Chair Chang: Super helpful.
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1 Chair Summa: I was going to ask Director Lait if... we didn't have any tentative future Agenda

items in our Packet or at least I didn't and so I'm assuming do you have that? Do you know or

3 maybe you don't?

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5 Mr. Lait: Let's see, I think we can speak to... if you give me a moment I can (interrupted)

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7 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Not a big deal, I just thought if you knew or if maybe my Packet was missing but

8 others.

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Mr. Lait: Yeah, I know that that's something that we typically provide. Let me just take a look

here. Okay, well let's see, what I... from what I see at your... there's a continued discussion on

the Work Plan that we're starting tonight. That's the only thing I see formally established and

for the meeting, after that, there is on April 26th we want to present some Zoning Code Text

Amendments related to the parklets standards. So, we'd be submitting that to... for the

Commission's review. It looks like there's a study session on the NVCAP scheduled, there's been

some refinements on that plan, and tentatively a discussion on AB 2097. That's a recent State

Law which I think we'll talk about as part of our discussion item tonight as well. And then Ms.

Star-Lack, it looks like there's also a study session to review quiet zones as a conceptual plan for

19 Palo Alto Avenue.

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- Chair Summa: Thank you for that. If there's nothing else we'll go onto our first item which is a 1 2 study session which is for us to review our 2022-2033 [note - 2023] Work Plan and discuss 3 drafting the 2023-2024 Work Plan. **Study Session** 4 5 Public Comment is Permitted. Three (3) minutes per speaker. 6 2. Review 2022-2023 Work Plan and Discuss Drafting the 2023-2024 PTC Work Plan 7 Chair Summa: And what I thought we would do is... does Staff have a presentation? I didn't 8 (interrupted) 9 10 Mr. Jonathan Lait, Director of Planning and Development Services: No, we don't. 11 12 Chair Summa: No, so what I thought... if this is okay, sounds good to everybody, we could do is just go through them one by one, and Director Lait could tell us if there's anything new or if it's 13 been completed or is no longer maybe consistent with Council priorities. And if that's okay and 14 15 then we can take comments from my colleagues. Commissioner Hechtman. 16 17 Commissioner Hechtman: If I could... if we could make... I had like an overall comment that may be would be better before we go through the 18 items. 18 19 20 Chair Summa: Okay, please. 21
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Commissioner Hechtman: Because honestly when I read this Work Plan, which we approved
last year, I didn't remember it. I didn't remember all of this detail and I didn't remember that it
had 18 items. I remember our discussion a year ago when we set our own priorities, but so and
I meant to go back and look at what was what we approved last year but I didn't. So, I assume
this is it but one thing I did, just to see sort of how we did, is I went through all of our Agendas
for the last year, since we approved this Work Plan, to see which of these 18 items we actually
tackled. And my effort was not very scientific, just looking at the titles of each item and trying
to figure out whether it fit any of these, but from my analysis, we hit Item Number Nine which
is the Housing Element Update. That was a big one, we saw that four times and we saw the
ADU Ordinance Updates five times. Among the other 16, I found we hit five of those one time,
and 11 of them we never talked about. Now again, that might not be exactly right but it's
probably pretty close and so as we I mean personally, I don't want to have a Work Plan with
11 things that we didn't touch.

And so, as we go through this exercise tonight, what I'm thinking is let's try to be realistic and let's figure out what legitimately may be coming to us in the next year that we can have some effect on or that we'll be discussing, so that we don't have 11 items next year that we didn't even touch because that just looks like we didn't get to stuff. And of course, that's not the case because these are things that all come to us.

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1 So anyway, so I wanted to provide that kind of color in advance so that we can be thinking

about that as we go through the individual items.

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4 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you for that. I did something kind of different but I print... there was a link

5 to the Council's... something Staff prepared for the Council Priorities where it... in our Staff

Report, in our Agenda I mean and it was... it found all the programs that relate to the priorities

of Council. And I kind of made a list because I always think we should maybe put those first

because Council has prioritized them. So, I kind of looked at it with that kind of CAP on is how

many of these... how many things that we have here align with Council Priorities, so just kind of

a different approach. So, thank you for that, and anyone else or? Oh, go ahead Commissioner

11 Templeton.

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13 Commissioner Templeton: Sure, thank you. I think both of these approaches are really good. I

was joking with Director Lait earlier that we have had the same things multiple times and we're

not really having the diversity of discussion that we had hoped to have last year.

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I am... I think the problem with having 18 priorities is those... that's not priorities like it's not

prioritized right, so and there's things that we had at the top that are safety and transportation

safety stuff that we haven't really gotten to. And so just want to echo some sentiments that we

have been discussing over the past year about how much we love the transportation team and

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- 1 want to work you to help discuss these issues that are really important life and death matters
- 2 to our community about how to get around the community safely. So, I know you're passionate
- 3 about that as well and so we're trying to figure out how to engage the community in
- 4 discussions in addition to housing, right? So, I just wanted to throw that out there. Thank you.

- 6 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you for that and then why don't we just go through them? These were not
- 7 prioritized, they were just in a random order. So, but why don't we got through them starting
- 8 with the first one which... and see if our Director Lait has comments or updates on... we can just
- 9 go through them one by one.

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11 Mr. Lait: So, Ms. Star-Lack will guide us through that, the first item.

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13 Ms. Star-Lack: Thank you, Director Lait.

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Mr. Lait: (off mic) We're also known as Sylvia [unintelligible]

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- 17 Ms. Star-Lack: I never all him that. So, for traffic safety we did come to PTC, we gave a road
- safety report on October 26th, 2022. We have... we don't do annual... we don't normally do an
- 19 annual report so when we have a report we bring it. We did just receive a federal grant to
- 20 upgrade that recent report to meet federal grant funding standards and that will likely come to

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1 you before it's final once we have a draft of that safety report so that will be coming. I'm not

2 sure when it will be coming but it will be coming but we have a grant to do the work so yeah.

That's my update on that.

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5 If you... I can say some additional things about traffic road safety since we're here and there's

interest. Just so the Commissioners understands and the public understands that we conduct

neighborhood traffic safety improvement projects on an ongoing basis. We don't bring them

here necessarily but we are doing this work all the time based on the 311s we receive, based on

traffic calming requests, based on locations where there have been collisions. For example,

Middlefield Road and Lincoln, that location... for that location we're finalizing a report which

recommendations for improvements to that intersection, and when that is done we'll conduct a

community meeting. Probably around the end of April and we will... and we may follow up with

an additional work shop if needed so that's the plan for that.

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And then I know that Commissioner Templeton is interested in El Camino Real and I wanted to

update you regarding the El Camino Real paving project that is... that Caltrans is planning for

some time at the end of this calendar year. I think there's been a... there's... I think there's been

a little bit of confusion and frankly, it was confusion on Staff's part I think originally too that this

was an opportunity to redesign El Camino. Caltrans does not view this repaving project as an

20 opportunity to redesign the road. They see it as a maintenance project. We've consulted our

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City/School Transportation Safety Committee and our Pedestrian and Bicycle Advisory
Committee for comments on the project and we've submitted those comments to Caltrans.

And they've actually been very diligently working to include those Committee's comments and
Staff's comments as well into their plans. These comments focus on bringing the signage,
striping, pavement stencils, and signals up to newer standards. Things like bike signal stencils in
left turn lanes, high visibility crosswalks across El Camino Real, bicycle lane line extensions. I
think we asked for stop... advanced stop bars so that the crosswalk was not the first line for
drivers to focus on for where to stop and bicycle lane line extension across El Camino where
bike lanes exist on both sides of the cross streets. It... you may have heard about other cities
who have jump onto the repaving project with their own money, their own environmental
cleared projects and they're giving that... those designs and money to Caltrans to get those
projects built with the repaving project. So, they're paying Caltrans, they say we know you're

conversation.

17 However, we are about to kick off our update to Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan.

The vision for El Camino Real, particularly with regard to vulnerable road users, so we are... you

coming through, do this for us. Those communities have already had a community

conversations about what El Camino should look like in the future and we have not had that

know that project will happen and we can have a conversation here about what we want to

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1	have happen and then we can pursue that. So, that's kind of how this is going from how from
2	my perspective.
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4	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you for that. Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang].
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6	Vice-Chair Chang: So, to clarify, the fact that we haven't had our community discussion doesn't
7	prevent us from then implementing any of those things. Even if we miss the timing with respect
8	to the repaving project, correct?
9	
10	Ms. Star-Lack: Correct.
11	
12	Vice-Chair Chang: Okay and then I had a question, you had mentioned that we received grant
13	funds to do the traffic safety and you said you didn't know when it would come, but is this
14	something that would come within the next year or with or is it longer timeframe?
15	
16	Ms. Star-Lack: I'm not exactly sure, I hope it would come in the next year because I want to get
17	the plan done before the next grant funding cycle. So, I want to accelerate it but I'm trying to
18	figure out how to (interrupted)
19	
20	<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Get it all done.

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- 2 Ms. Star-Lack: Get this... get resources going on this plan, thank you.
- 4 Vice-Chair Chang: Great, okay I ask just because if it is something that will happen this year we
- 5 can leave it... we can put that on our Work Plan, right? Yeah, thanks.
- 7 Chair Summa: Any other comments? Oh, okay.
- 9 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Oh, can you... maybe we should move that so she can see my light.
- 11 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> This?

Commissioner Templeton: Thank you. Thank you for those updates. It's very helpful to hear the progress when we don't hear... we assume nothings being done so it's really helpful. My concern and the purpose for bringing up other cities that are near by and how they are taking quick action to prevent future deaths at dangerous intersections is because that's exactly what's happening. They've had a fatal incident with a child and they're addressing it. This incident happened a year after our City's incident with a child and I don't see any improvements and it's frustrating to me because you know, as you know, I've witnessed collisions. I've heard about these other collisions and we... I know you know this but I'm saying

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it for the record. We encourage our children to bike to school and many children have to cross El Camino to get to school, to get to Barron Park, to get to Gunn, to get to Fletcher. Some kids are going the other direction across Alma to get to Fair Meadow and JLS. So, these are real concerns, and its important for us to advocate for the work that you're doing and to prioritize it. And not only get it funded but get it moving as soon as possible because we don't want any more children to die getting to school or crossing the road because they're using a bike. We want them to be safe and comfortable on their bikes. So, it's really important to hear that you are working on this and that we can retrofit El Camino to be safer.

My concerns and one thing about bringing it up is they are going to bring some of their intersections into line. As you mentioned, they are taking some of our feedback and if there's anything that we can do on some of these intersections. Let us know how we can help you push that through. Right, this is... the point of us asking for you... for transportation to come and engage with us is to help get these things done and help shine a light on the work that you're doing. So, if there is a possibility of you coming here for a study session and talking about and getting a community conversation here. Yes, you need them in the neighborhoods too but it would be a really good opportunity for you to showcase the work that you're doing and inform us because it factors... the transportation situation factors into a lot of what we do. So, thank you for the update.

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1	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Commissioner Reckdahl.
2	
3	Commissioner Reckdahl: No to be ignorant but the other cities, what are they doing? They had
4	this community conversation, decided to do make some changes. What kind of changes do
5	they make?
6	
7	Ms. Star-Lack: Mountain View will be adding protected bike lanes on El Camino. They're
8	(interrupted)
9	
10	Commissioner Reckdahl: On El Camino or across [unintelligible] (interrupted)
11	
12	Ms. Star-Lack: On El Camino, they will be removing on-street parking to put in protected bike
13	lanes. There's a small part in Los Altos, they will also be removing parking in order to put in
14	protect or buffered bike lanes on El Camino in Los Altos. And then Menlo Park, I believed but
15	don't but I need to I wasn't able to get the update today but I believe Menlo Park is also
16	moving towards putting protected bike lanes on El Camino in Menlo Park.
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18	Commissioner Reckdahl: And if we wanted to do something similar could we just do it ourselves
19	or do we have to get approval from Caltrans?
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1	Ms. Star-Lack: We would have to get approval from Caltrans but these other cities got approval
2	from Caltrans.
3	
4	Commissioner Reckdahl: Okay.
5	
6	Commissioner Templeton: There's more. Right, they're retrofitting the intersection or they're
7	improving the safety at the intersection where the little boy died as part of this project.
8	
9	Ms. Star-Lack: In Mountain View?
10	
11	Commissioner Templeton: Yeah.
12	
13	Ms. Star-Lack: Okay, yeah I'm not (interrupted)
14	
15	Commissioner Templeton: Well, that's what they said. I don't know if it's in the current plan but
16	they did say this after he died.
17	
18	Commissioner Reckdahl: I mean some places on El Camino the median is quite narrow and so if
19	someone's half way through, especially if an older person is crossing and they can't make it.
20	There's no refuge and I would think that increasing the width of that would be pretty easy to

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1 do. You might lose a foot on each side but there would be a big safety benefit. Is that 2 something that we can request? 3 4 Ms. Star-Lack: Yeah, we can request those things. Generally, we have to get a grant or you 5 know, it wouldn't be something that we can just go ahead and do. It's a whole process. 6 7 Commissioner Reckdahl: But during this repaving, they're not changing the medians. They're 8 just purely repaying. 9 Ms. Star-Lack: They might be making some changes, not very major changes, however. I don't 10 11 think they're adding in pedestrian refuge islands as part of the repaving. They might be making 12 small changes but yeah. 13 14 Commissioner Reckdahl: Okay and for Charleston/Arastradero at El Camino, they're still under 15 work there. Are they going to improve the bike situation at that spot because that was always very hard because you have a bike line and all of a sudden it disappears and it becomes a right 16 17 turn lane and that's really dangerous. 18 19 Ms. Star-Lack: Yeah, that's our project, that's not the Caltrans project. Yes, and getting that bike 20 lane all the way through there was really important to me so yes that will be coming.

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2	Commissioner Reckdahl: I look forward to that, thanks.
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4	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Commissioner Templeton, do you have something else?
5	
6	Commissioner Templeton: Yes, I do. Why did Caltrans change the date from spring of 2023 to
7	end of year? We're in desperate need to repaving El Camino, it is dangerous.
8	
9	Ms. Star-Lack: I don't know, I don't know what happened there. I think design can sometimes
10	run into issues so I'm not exactly sure why it was delayed.
11	
12	<u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> [unintelligible – no audio]
13	
14	Chair Summa: Oh, Commissioner Templeton I'm sorry I was just wondering if your light was
15	working. It's not showing up here. Oh, that's fine, I can do that too.
16	
17	<u>Commissioner Hechtman: (off mic)</u> [unintelligible] her light still on [unintelligible]?
18	
19	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay, thanks.
20	

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1 Commissioner Reckdahl: So, Commissioner Templeton, when you say it's dangerous because of

2 potholes, or are there other issues?

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4 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Yeah, the pot holes, the lane width, the... there's... I've mentioned

this before but over by my neighborhood in Barron Park at El Camino Way crossing El Camino

Real it's nine lanes wide. You've got two parking lanes, you've got three lanes in either

direction, and a turn lane and it's a pathway to get to Gunn. So, a lot of those kids are rushing

to get to school and having a hard time deciding if they have enough time to get across El

Camino. I witnessed a collision there of two girls on their way to school. You know it's a lot and

my son goes to school across that street as well and I don't feel like it's safe for him but I... it's

heavily used and if you add the pot holes in. The rough paving... disintegrating pavement into

that equation it gets even worse. It's harder to navigate that. You're more likely to fall off and

people can't always see because the angle of the sun in the morning when kids are on their

way to school. They can't always see well in the intersection if someone is lying on the ground.

It's really dangerous.

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Chair Summa: Any other discussion on Goal 1? Commissioner Hechtman, please.

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1 Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, so to kind of finish this off and maybe sort of set the templet

2 for how we need to go about this because tonight what we're trying to do is it's not so much a

review of what we did last year as develop our Work Plan for this coming year.

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5 Right and so right now Project Number... Goal Number One, study session to discuss traffic

6 safety, we did that October 26th. So, the question is do we want a Project Goal for this coming

year that relates to traffic safety and given some of the discussion we've heard from the

Commission tonight, it's pretty clear that it's super important to us and so we would like to

have some traffic safety work that we can do this year. That would be... it seems like a goal of

ours but I think we should be ending each of these discussions as we go through these goals

with should it stay on the plan for the coming year?

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Some of these I think we're going to find that they're not likely to come to us in the next year

and so I'm wondering if we can put those in possible goals for future years. So, we don't lose

them but just take them off our active list if we're not really expecting. So, but for this

particular one, I think we're interested if that report is finished. If what Ms. Star-Lack was

talking about with the grant and the report, if that's done we'd like to make some progress on

that in our coming year and so maybe we should have Staff write up this traffic safety project

goal tied to that and just reflect that there's somewhat uncertainty about whether the report

will be prepared in this next cycle for us but if it is we want to work on it.

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2 Chair Summa: Yeah, that sounds right. Commissioner Templeton, did you have something?

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4 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> I did, I just wanted to say that maybe we should be more specific in

how we write this because I'm not... I was not satisfied with that report as far as improving

traffic safety in the City. I know they did deliver a report but it had a lot of gaps in it as far as the

things that we were mentioning tonight. So, I don't know how we phrase that more accurately,

and maybe that's something we can leave to the Chair and Vice-Chair but I think it... if you feel

like that that item has been checked off then maybe we need to rephrase it.

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Chair Summa: Well, I think we need to broaden it to reflect general concerns about traffic

safety and address them in the City. And I think Ms. Star-Lack has sort of a plan for what she's

going to do with that this year and we would like to be a part of that. I think that's the way it

kind of to phrase it. So, with that... oh, go ahead. Oh, okay, so with that I think we can move on.

I think that's enough... is that enough information for Staff at this point?

16

17 Ms. Star-Lack: Yes, thank you.

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1 Chair Summa: I think we can move onto Goal Number Two which I'll just preface by saying that

2 this aligns with Council Priorities and I would think we would want to keep it. So, does Staff

3 have an update on... I mean Director Lait have an update?

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5 Mr. Lait: So, this is one that I actually think is somewhat tied to Goal Number Seven and I would

recommend merging those if we're going to keep this on. The City Council has asked and the

Commission has participated in discussions concerning retail and more recently you've had the

conversation about the CUP Thresholds and so and the Commission forwarded a

recommendation. You wanted to continue that, Staff wanted to it get it done, and we... you

know the Council said no, we're going to send it back to the Commission to review. The reason

Staff wanted to call that one done is because we're actually working on a more comprehensive

project and what we're basically doing now is just folding everything into one effort.

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There's a couple of things that the Council's has asked us to do. One is retail... the retail

preservation, they wanted us to look at that and just examine our... you know is the policy

intent of that program achieving its goal? Is there other things that we're not realizing as a

result of that policy? That's one. CUP Thresholds is the other one that you've talked about. In

general, there is a third one is just sort of this general sense of wanting to understand what's

the proper definition of retail anymore with sort of the evolving nature of retail. A fourth item

is this idea of on a City-wide basis lets take a look at retail and understand the landscape, the

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conditions and we're getting part of that story from Streetscape which is another consultant

2 that's also working on retail-related information. And then the Council asked us to understand

not just City-wide but on a district level do we need to make changes to our permitted uses and

do we need to look at parking and do we need to look at some of these things that would

provide an opportunity to encourage retail?

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7 And so, we've engaged Michael Baker International to help us prepare a report. They submitted

a draft report, it's something that we were going to send to the Commission but we decided

that it's not quite ready and it needs a fair amount more information. And so, we are currently

looking at a revised scope to have them engage in some additional work. Including looking at

the Streetscape study that is... was done and continues to be worked on. And I understand in

the next month or two that effort I think is coming close to an end so we'll incorporate that

information.

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We've asked IMB to, they've done some interviews with property owners. We wanted them to

also reach out to some more local business owners on California Avenue, Middlefield, on El

Camino as well as Downtown University. So, we can get a little more rounder perspective on

that issue and also to compare us to other... just another jurisdiction. Just to make sure that

we're not in this bubble and have that sort of perspective and along the way, we want to know

what's the sort of best management practices to the extent that they exist for retail regulation.

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2 And there's, again this is will come up a few times tonight, AB 2097 ahs implications to our local

environment. This just... to... if you don't know what that's about that's a State bill that says if

you're housing or commercial project within a half mile of, in our instance Caltrain station, you

do not have to provide any parking for that development. There's some exceptions like hotels

need to provide parking and I think there's one other one but that's a big deal. And so, we'll talk

about that probably throughout the night and how does that work for our retailers and is that a

good thing for them. Right, if presumably do they, you know just because you can, does that

mean do you want to? You want people to be able to park and go to your place.

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So, anyways, that's a whole lot to say this is a big issue and we're definitely going to be coming

to the Planning and Transportation Commission to help us along the way and we really are

going to need your guidance to help titrate this approach that we're moving. So, that when we

go to the City Council we've got a Commission endorsed and a thoughtful analysis that we can

present with some standards. So, I'm excited about that one but I still feel like we're in the

16 beginning stages of it.

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<u>Chair Summa:</u> Right and to the extent, I think we can consolidate kind of in a general sense all

of our retail things and leave that as a goal because these goals are not programs. They're

20 broad (interrupted)

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2 Mr. Lait: Right.

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- 4 <u>Chair Summa:</u> They can be broader than that. Commissioner Chang [note Vice-Chair Chang],
- 5 did you (interrupted)

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7 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> [unintelligible – off mic]

8

- 9 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Oh, I thought you had your light on, sorry. Do I have other comments?
- 10 Commissioner Hechtman.

- 12 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Yeah, thank you, so on this one we did have on our August 31st
- 13 Agenda retail recovery and CUP Thresholds. So, traveling together at least at that point and this
- 14 is the issue that went to the Council a couple of months ago on making permanent the
- 15 Temporary Ordinance. Right and what the Director said at that time, and he explained a little
- bit about it this time, is that if the ordinance stays temporary which ultimately it did, it's going
- 17 to be in that condition realistically for 18-months was the timeline that we talked about there
- 18 because that's how long this more comprehensive approach is going to take and so, recognizing
- 19 that, that was two months ago, recognizing that that's past this next cycle. So, when Staff
- 20 modifies this Project Goal Number Two and merges it with Seven, I would like them to reflect

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1	that we're not the expectation is not to get to the end in this coming cycle but rather to
2	basically move the ball forward toward the end which is expected in the next cycle. And that'll
3	dove tail with Staff's anticipated timing so we're not setting expectations too high.
4	
5	Mr. Lait: Maybe just a clarification for myself because these Work Plans are somewhat new. Is it
6	a fiscal year Work Plan or a calendar year because I see this as a fiscal year?
7	
8	Commissioner Hechtman: Well, I think we adopt this in late April so I and starting now. Right,
9	this isn't already 4 months past?
10	
11	Mr. Lait: Right.
12	
13	Chair Summa: No, well it is was new so but I kind of thought it happened I thought it was
14	suppose to be in around April when because the Council aligned all the appointments for all
15	Boards and Commissions start April 1st and this kind of happened but maybe that needs to be
16	clarified.
17	
18	Mr. Lait: Okay, I (interrupted)
19	
20	Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah.
	

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1 Chair Summa: Right, this meeting was to sort of tee things up and tighten our last year's to let 2 them participate. 3 4 Commissioner Hechtman: Okay so that's a good point so yeah, if we are thinking of a July 1 to June 30th period then maybe... that is pretty close to 18-months from a couple months ago so 5 6 maybe we will get to the end. Okay, thanks. 7 Commissioner Hechtman: Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang]. 8 9 Vice-Chair Chang: My understanding is that we're suppose to have... in somewhere, right either 10 11 our Boards and Commission Handbook or something, it's by the end of Q2 that we're supposed 12 to have this to Council so that would fit with the fiscal year. 13 14 Chair Summa: Thank you for remembering that. Other comments on this? No, okay then let's 15 go onto Goal 3 which is I think one we won't want to keep in as it seems relative to Council 16 Priorities and also, some of our own concerns. So, Director Lait, did you have comments on Goal 3? 17 18 19 Mr. Lait: Sure, let's see, so this is we're calling the neighborhood plans here and I think we are 20 familiar with these plans as coordinated area plans. And I don't know if there... if that was

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1 intentionally left off this particular Work Plan item or not and we've heard a lot about

2 neighborhood plans in how other jurisdictions are using them to help plan for and build housing

3 as well as any other types of land uses. And we even had the Grant Jury Report make that

recommendation that the City should evoke more specific plans or area plans to help focus that

5 effort.

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7 And as the Commission is aware, first hand, these plans take time and they are costly and we're

still working our way through the NVCAP process. That's just one plan of 80 acres or something

that we're working with so. The Council did recently give us direction to come up with a

schedule for coordinated area plans on El Camino Real, San Antonio, California Avenue, and

Downtown and so that's our goal for 2023 is to come with a schedule for options on how we

12 might begin to roll that out.

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Commissioner Reckdahl: What were those three places again?

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Mr. Lait: It was four places, Downtown University, Downtown Cal Ave, and El Camino Real and I

think the one that... I think we wall agree it needs to be maybe prioritized is San Antonio.

Particularly with the amount of housing that's being contemplated in that area.

19

20 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Yeah and that's a mighty big list really, that's like a decade of work.

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3 million but.

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5 <u>Chair Summa:</u> But to the extent that we're going to have a new neighborhood on San Antonio

6 near 101. I think that's the place where we really need, personally, I think we need to keep that

in mind and I didn't read this necessarily, but of course, Council is giving you direction that we

have to have area plans for all of these areas, but that we needed to keep in mind with the

changes and the growth in the City in response to the State mandates. That we have to make

sure we're accommodating the residents of these future places and that they have bike lanes

and parks and things like that so.

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13 Mr. Lait: I agree and I do think we might want to be open-minded to different approaches to

developing these coordinated area plans. I just think we need to be... we need to process these

things more quickly (interrupted)

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17 Chair Summa: Yeah.

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19 Mr. Lait: So, that they're relevant and it's not going to do us any good if it takes us 8-years to

develop a plan and so we'll need to really think through our engagement strategy, and how do

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1	we handle differences	of	perspectives	on	what	needs	to	be	accomplished in	ıa	a way	that	keeps
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the ball moving but gets all the voices heard and help us develop this. And so anyways, those

3 are just somethings that would be really helpful to check in with the Commission to see how we

can do this because I think NVCAP, you know, that's another thing that we should probably do

at the end. We hope to be done with that project at the end of this year. We should do sort of a

check-in to see what worked and what didn't work about that particular program so that we

don't repeat the parts that didn't work.

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9 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Yeah and I think we have to fold these kinds of thoughtfulness into when we get

individual and smaller projects that come to us. We have to think about how is this going to

work and can we get these other things that are not amenities. They're necessities for

neighborhoods so I kind of see it as part of all of our planning on... that we're going to do is to

accommodate for this. So, I have some ideas about that but I'll go to my colleagues and I think

14 Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang] was first.

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<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> So, my first it's a question, so with respect to San Antonio, does that include

Antonio because if it's limited to San Antonio it doesn't really solve fully what the issue is I

18 think?

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1 Mr. Lait: Correct, I agree. I'm using, in my mind and that's dangerous to just have it in my mind,

2 when I say San Antonio I'm thinking of the areas where we're proposing housing. So, that is

3 inclusive of all of San Antonio from the San Antonio Caltrain station down to sort of the Google

Plex and all the places in Palo Alto in between is sort of when I think about that plan.

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6 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Okay and for context, this came... this was written in this way I believe

because I had brought up precisely the issue of these... this housing, the vast change that's

going to come, and if we need parks, need schools, need bike paths. If we don't get out in front

of it then the developments are going to come piece meal over I mean the next 8-years there

will probably be a few that come. So, if we don't know where we want a park or a school or a

bike path. Then it makes it really hard to... we just have to approve it right if there's no plan in

place? So, yeah I think that we specifically didn't say area plan knowing that the current process

for an area plan is long, costly, and potentially pieces of it not very effective. So, that's why it's

phrased the way it is, like how do we do this?

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Mr. Lait: You know, as I think about it further, before I go back to the City Council with a

recommendation I'd like to actually come back to the Commission and we can maybe have a

meeting or two to sort of talk through that. So, that a proposal could be submitted to the

Council that says here's what we think needs... here's what we think needs to be included in a

plan like this and you know, in this plan here, and maybe work... maybe take a look at the Code

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1 that sets forth the process for the coordinated area plan and see how we can apply that in a

2 way that will be useful.

4 Chair Summa: Commissioner Reckdahl and then Commissioner Hechtman.

front so.

Commissioner Reckdahl: I was on NVCAP and my first reaction was we want something more nimble than NVCAP and I think one of the biggest problems with the NVCAP is the success of SOFA. And that since SOFA was so successful we kind of patterned after that but it was a totally different problem. That was really one land owner and so could actually do the design and for NVCAP you had all these land owners. You really had a or we should have concentrated more on zoning and say what... how would we change the zoning to get what we want because we didn't have control over the properties. So, I would think we have to... and that's in some ways a simpler problem like we spent a lot of time looking at what kind of... what style of housing we liked and didn't like and that's kind of irrelevant when you're maybe ARB. If the ARB would had reviewed this but for most of NVCAP it would have been better off saying what do we envision and what won't be done if we leave the zoning as is. I think that would be a crispier way of doing that but I agree, down in San Antonio we need a lot of work. There's parks and bike lanes and if they start building there won't be room for parks and bike lanes so we have to get out in

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Chair Summa: Commissioner Hechtman.

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3 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> So, this is the kind of generic neighborhood planning goal, right?

4 NVCAP is its own thing. That's Goal 8. So here our goal was to have a study session regarding

neighborhood planning and we haven't done it so far. And I guess there's a question, are we

going to do it between now and the end of June? If not, then we didn't meet this goal this year

and so then my question is are we going to do it next year and what's that... right because if it's

going to be here in some form.

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We need to have a strategy to actually work on it and so that can take two forms. The more

likely and more typical form is Staff brings us the item and Director Lait was just talking about

that. As they are formulating how this is going to work, maybe they'll bring us something before

it would go to Council and that's kind of... and my impression of what the Director was saying

was this is kind of more at the macro stage. Really just getting our arms around it right and that

would be great and if that's what we're going to do then let's have this reflect it.

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The other way is we initiate, right we have to find time on our own Agenda and we've done this

a couple of times but we do it rarely and in fact I think this is what happened with the traffic

safety study session last October. We said we want this, right you may not have, you may...

20 Staff, you may not be processing something that would require you to bring it to us. We want

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this and so again, it can work either way but if it's going to appear on our list we need to commit that it's going to happen one way or another. And if we don't think it's going to happen in the next fiscal year, possibly because you know first... really where this really ties to is the next RHNA cycle, because later this year we're going to get our Housing Element certified and then we're going to engage in a significant rezoning, upzoning, of a lot of Palo Alto property that right now isn't planned for that kind of residential density. And there are going to be new neighborhoods on paper at least and a lot of new neighborhoods on paper and I think we're going to have to... and we're not going to be able to plan all of those neighborhoods in the next year and a half. And so, we're going to have to perform some kind of triage and figure out which are the most likely to develop soonest and how much attention can we put to those. So that as Vice-Chair Chang was saying they don't... the development doesn't happen ahead of the planning.

So, I mean I think this is a really important issue but I think we just have to have a real strategy in this project goal and a reality about whether there's something for us to do in the next calendar year. And if so, let's identify it, and let's say it's either Staff driven or Commission driven.

Chair Summa: I agree and the other... I think there's two things I want to add and one is that

20 there are certain principles that may apply City-wide that may come to mind mostly because of

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1 the changes to the South Palo Alto 101 area. Whatever we're going to call that neighborhood

2 and I think that... so there's that.

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4 The other thing is last year Assistant Director Tanner wrote this because it was new and there

5 was urgency to get it done on time. I invite all of my colleagues to take a crack at writing these

things the way... if its... if Staff agrees to potentially write some of these if you think there's a

better way or maybe Staff wants to write it I don't know. It wasn't very clear last year who the

work was suppose to... who was suppose to be doing this but I think there... I think its right that

we didn't have the study session. That's true but I think it's more important that going forward

we try to incorporate principles that will work all over the City and think about that new

neighborhood because it's really going to be bad if it just happens... for people living there it

just happens without this kind of planning. So, would Staff like help from the Commission in

writing these goals, or do they... do you see that as your (interrupted)

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Mr. Lait: Let's see, the... yeah no I... this is... I think it's a collaborative effort that we need to...

you know we want this to reflect the Commission's Work Plan. And I think it just needs to be

balanced with the understanding that the Council assigns the work to Staff and we've got more

than a full boat of items to work on. So, I would... in an were it is aligned with the Council

Priorities, in think in particular that's a good one for us be thinking about collaboratively how

20 can we achieve the goals that you want to achieve and that advances the project forward.

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2 Chair Summa: Commissioner Chang [note - Vice-Chair Chang].

4 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> So, it sounds like... so to respond to Commissioner Hechtman's question

5 about is this something that is Staff led or Commission led? It sounds like because this is 100

percent aligned with what Council has asked. That this might be one where it actually makes

more sense for it to be Staff led. Do you agree?

Mr. Lait: I think the Council recognized when they assigned this to us that we didn't have a lot of time to actually work on it and they were clear that they weren't expecting anything this calendar year. And that's why they said come back with a schedule of when we might be able to tackle these things and so that's the assignment and so the extent that we're talking about something beyond that. I think we just need to understand what your interests are and I do think there's opportunities for study session discussion looking at the Code, looking at what's required for these CAPs, what would we want to study in these CAPs. I mean I'll share with you that I spoke with the Chair and the Vice-Chair of the Architectural Review Board and they have an interest in meeting at a joint session with the Commission to talk about San Antonio in particular. And that might be when I think about goals and actionable things that can be accomplished, that might be something where the Commission and the ARB can start brainstorming some ideas that might begin to form the basis of a scope of work that we might

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want to send out to somebody through our RFP process. I mean I would think the San Antonio

2 one is going to be the first one that we're going to want to tackle and I think that's going to

probably come up pretty soon. When I say soon, like within the next year we're going to want

4 to probably start focusing in on that.

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6 Vice-Chair Chang: So, if your deadline or if your assignment from Council for the year is to get

7 essentially a timeline. Doesn't that then sort of imply that you... I mean was it... is Council

completely prescriptive in saying it needs to be a coordinated area plan, or is there leeway in

there to decide what type of plan it is that we can do in what timeframe?

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Mr. Lait: So, I would like to think there's some leeway in there. I will say that our Code only

provides for a coordinated area plan. So, we've got this balancing act and I would want to check

in with legal and understand we're kind of doing something like this with the Downtown

Housing Plan. We're not calling it a coordinated area plan and that one we're having a hard

time just getting off the ground. Even getting a consultant on board to help us so you know I

know there's ways that we can navigate it and just would want to... that's an area where I think

there's a great opportunity to engage the Commission. To say what are the parameters of this

and to my earlier comment, how is this going to be different than the CAP, like what are we

going to do differently, and what's a clear sort of what's success, how do we get there? That's

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the kind of conversation that I think would be helpful as we start to think about doing more of

2 these.

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4 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> So, yeah so it sounds like there's... so it's not specifically this goal as written

here but it sounds like there's two pieces that we might be able to commit to doing sometime

this year. One is a study session with ARB specifically thinking about San Antonio area but kind

of bigger picture and maybe the timing would be after Ventura... after the NVCAP is done is sort

of more of a post-mortem/process discussion about how can we do a plan that's not a not

necessarily a CAP.

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Mr. Lait: Yeah, so I would... I agree, I think we should rewrite this goal. That would be my suggestion and really try to focus it from a standpoint of how can Palo Alto efficiently prepare a

plan. And that plan will include obviously housing and transportation, you know multi-model

access. We're going to want to consider access to schools. We want to be mindful of parks and

amenities that we're going to want for retail and services and so forth but those are... that's not

really what... where I want to focus this. I'm more interested in the process because the process

is what where we get sometimes bogged down and how are we going to navigate through

decent or differing points of view expeditiously? That would be helpful to get that feedback

from the Commission and then be able to transmit that to the Council and say... because I

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agree. We're never going to... we will never rise up to the standard of SOFA. It just... it's not

2 going to happen and so not having to reach for that as a benchmark would be helpful.

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Chair Summa: Commissioner Reckdahl.

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6 <u>Commissioner Reckdahl:</u> You mentioned Downtown Housing Plan, is that the same as the

7 Downtown Plan? I know when we were looking at rail crossings XCAP did not consider Palo Alto

Avenue because they wanted to wait for the Downtown Plan. Is that plan different than the

Downtown Housing Plan or?

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Mr. Lait: I... maybe? I do know that we, as planners right, we were thinking big for this area. You

12 know we're thinking University, we're thinking the Transit Center and all of the uses that take

place there. We're thinking of the ownership of the Transit Center and Stanford and

connections to the Stanford Shopping Center and the academic lands and just own sort of

integration. That was a big project and millions of dollars would be required to even prepare

that plan and we had applied for a grant. We did receive a grant from MTC four about \$800,00 I

think it was but because \$800,000 is far short of where we needed to be for that broader plan.

We scaled something back to be really just about housing and housing opportunities Downtown

that would feed off of the Housing Element discussion that we've had. So, that's what I'm

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1 calling the Downtown Housing Plan to be distinguished from something broader than what

2 (interrupted)

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4 Commissioner Reckdahl: I'm a little worried that if we make it to broad it's going to be forever.

We don't get anything done and I think rezoning Downtown I mean there's a lot of low-density

areas that you could put a lot of housing Downtown. And so maybe looking at that and looking

at what are the hurdles. Why wouldn't people put housing there and addressing that as a more

focused study that would be faster and have a better effect than having a grand plan that looks

at rail crossings and everything?

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Mr. Lait: Yeah and maybe they have been. Maybe they sync up at some point but I agree with

you being really focused in on the topic and borrow from our Housing Element and even maybe

go beyond in some areas if we feel like that would be appropriate. The reason I don't think we

put more into the Housing Element is because we recognized that there was more... we didn't

want to rely initially right off... right out of the bat to... for that area but that is a prudent area

for housing for obvious reasons.

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Commissioner Reckdahl: Yeah, I mean I think a lot of seniors could... would sell their house and

move Downtown. I mean you're close to restaurants, I mean Stanford Theater is there,

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shopping's, it could be a very good vibrant place for someone who doesn't want to full single-

2 family house anymore.

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4 Mr. Lait: Yeah, so you know in some ways maybe we're checking one of these plans off the list if

we can get this housing plan... Downtown Housing Plan rolling. Maybe that could be a focus of

6 that area.

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8 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you. Let's move onto Project Goal Number Four which I think is written in

a manner that we've already moved kind of beyond the study session and we have various

overlapping plans already being considered. That are already at the Council level being

considered by Council for Cal Ave so we want to... I think we want to keep this in mind but

make it sort of up to date with what we've done so far for Cal Ave and Cal Ave is certainly a

priority for Council. Any comments or?

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Mr. Lait: I think I actually I don't know... there's so much in this and it's very high level and

broadly written on some scale that I actually don't know what it is we're to accomplish in this

particular goal and like you noted Chair, I think there's elements of this that are scattered

throughout other goals.

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- 1 Chair Summa: So, maybe the best way to restate this because Cal Ave has various things already
- 2 being considered for by Council is to kind of reflect that and how... if we can still help with it
- and just completely rewrite this, you know, it's just and or edit this. We don't need a study
- 4 session, we've gone... we've moved beyond that for Cal Ave.

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- 6 Mr. Lait: Yeah, I think Sylvia and I would support rewriting this so that there was some clearer
- 7 objectives that we're trying to achieve.

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9 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you. Commissioner Templeton.

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- 11 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> I just want to echo your comments. I think this needs to be simple,
- 12 like support Council's progress on California Avenue objectives or something like that. Just be
- there to... like that's going to be a lot of work so to simplify and update I love that.

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15 Chair Summa: Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang].

- 17 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Well, yeah I mean because I think we're supposed to support Council's efforts
- 18 on everything so another alternative would be to just... unless there's something specific that
- 19 we know is going to come to us. Potentially to just delete it given that it... the items didn't really
- 20 come to us, they went straight to Council. I'm not sure, so unless Director Lait you know that

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- there's something brewing in the next year that will come to us. I mean I know that Council
- wants an area plan for Cal Ave but we're not going to be doing that in the next year. So, I tend
- 3 to say it either just delete it or like Commissioner Templeton says make it completely general.

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5 Mr. Lait: Yeah, I think we (interrupted)

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7 Ms. Star-Lack: [unintelligible – off mic]

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- 9 Mr. Lait: Right, yeah but we agree. There's key elements of this goal that are referenced in here
- that are covered in other goals and work effort. So, we would support deleting it.

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12 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay, Commissioner Hechtman.

- 14 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> I agree with that. Also, what I notice is Project Goal 18 is Cal Ave and
- 15 Romona Street closures which is really tied very strongly to what the purpose of four was as to
- 16 Cal Ave. And the reality is if we're closing Romona, there's going to be a planning process for
- 17 that too, and so I'm wondering if the vestiges of... if four can go away and the vestiges of that
- can be carried into 18 which we'll talk about later. At least let's kind of put a pin in that until we
- 19 get to 18, but I like the idea of getting rid of four and possibly if there's any content left that we
- want to retain think about that in 18.

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2 Chair Summa: Commissioner Templeton.

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4 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> So, I agree with Vice-Chair Chang that we are here to support

5 everything Council does that involves planning and transportation. So, that leaves me with the

question of why are we doing this plan at all. So, how do you... in other words, how do you

differentiate which things go in here and which things don't? So, we have a couple of ways we

could approach this. It could be that we only call out things that might be not prioritized on

Council's plan, but then again why would we do that? And so, I think we leave ourselves a little

ambiguity about what the point of this plan is.

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Chair Summa: I couldn't agree more, so if there's no other comments about four we can move

13 onto five.

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Mr. Lait: And maybe just to comment on that, when you said the Work Plan, in general, I think

it's helpful just to know what's coming down over the next year. And in some ways, I don't

think it was effective in this go around only because there's so much on here and there wasn't

this time to really thoughtfully get into it like you're doing this year but aligning Staff's work

with Commission input. I think helps keep us sort of on track and then we can have this be

something that is transmitted as your Packet too. So, that if you're also seeing hey Staff, what

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- about this thing that is on our Work Plan here, when are you going to come back to us? That's a
- 2 good way to sort of keep things moving because we get bogged down in a lot of stuff. You
- 3 know, I'd hate to admit it but having that gentle reminder might be a useful tool.

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5 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay, thanks for that, and (interrupted)

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7 Commissioner Templeton: Chair? Chair?

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9 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Oh, go ahead.

less, 10 or fewer.

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Commissioner Templeton: Just to follow-up on that, we meet 20 times a year and we have 18 goals. Right, I'm not trying to say we shouldn't do it, I'm just trying to say we need to understand why we're doing it and what the benefit is. And you just shared an important benefit so I think we're starting to define the parameters of what we should be doing here. So, I could say that 18 is definitely too many and we kind of knew that already but just to explicitly say that if we're going to remind you and we know we have some things that take many sessions. Like we should really concentrate on what goes on this list. I mean I'm thinking 10 or

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1 Chair Summa: Let's move onto Goal Number Five then which is wireless. Would Director Lait

2 like to give us a little update?

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4 Mr. Lait: Actually, I just messaged Staff to see if I can get an update on this one. I actually... I

5 know there's work being done in to refine the standards but its clearly not on a... it's not as far

along as I would have hoped at this point. And I think part of that is some of the vacancies we

have in our current planning program being diverted to other resources so. I'll try to get a next-

step update for you this evening on that but otherwise, it's still something that I know that

we're working on. There's some refinements at need to be made. I feel like we've come before

the Commission on this topic and I think there's some guidance that we received about

checking in with the wireless carriers was one piece, checking in with the neighbors, and

following... oh, we checked in with the carriers. The direction was to follow-up and check in

with the neighbors and we're trying to develop a system to... that makes these applications

processed in a reasonable timeframe with awareness to the community and standards that

we're going to be looking for. So, its again just kind of coming up with these Objective

Standards but I need to get a date for when we're going to come back.

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18 Chair Summa: Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang].

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Vice-Chair Chang: I know that there's just to much work for Staff and all these vacancies and that's why... and to kind of to piggy back on your point about you know you need that update. So, my understanding, at least when we did the study session, was that the State or I think it was a judge ruling but basically that we're kind of not... because our ordinance isn't updated, because we don't have those Objective Standards. It's like a lost opportunity for our... for the City to make things the way that we want it, but obviously things... you know Housing Element or cellphone towers? So, the Housing Element obviously was something that was critical that we had to do. So, is this something that we would keep on here or is it something... I mean we do need to keep our ordinance updated and create these Objective Standards. I think we're already 3-years, maybe now it's 4? I'm losing track of when it came for us for a study session. So, then how... like I don't... to Commissioner Hechtman's point, I don't want to put things on here with we're not going to do them, but then at the same time if I take a giant step back. I'm thinking well if we're... if we should have done it 3-years ago. We can't keep kicking the can down the road. So, I just... and I don't... this is... that... this is not work that the Commission can do, so we will need to review the ordinance but it's not work the Commission should do. So, that's kind of why I'm turning around to you and asking what do we do with this one.

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Chair Summa: And I'm going to go to my colleagues in a second but I will just make a comment

that Director Lait said this... the Work Plan was helpful for Staff to remind them of things. So, in

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that sense, I think we should keep this on here because there's a lot of interest and concern in

the community. Yeah, are you...? Okay, Commissioner Templeton.

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4 Commissioner Templeton: Thank you. I don't think that we need to drive this and I don't

believe that it would be us remind Staff for this one. So, I agree with Vice-Chair Chang that is

doesn't come close in order of magnitude to the other things we've been talking about. So, if

we needed to cut one, I'm not saying don't do it, obviously, it needs to be done and that's

something that your department will take care of. And we'll be here for you but I'm not sure it

is something we need to cluster in our Work Plan if we're winnowing it down.

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Chair Summa: Commissioner Hechtman.

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Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, thank you, so this is not a wish list. This is a to-do list and it's a

non... it's a non-exclusive to-do list because really Item Number One is anything that comes to

us, right? Again, I looked through all of last year's Agenda items, I'm going to say there was

maybe 45 different Agenda items we've had in the last year and I just went April to April kind

of. 14 of them were on this list so only a third of what we actually did shows up on this list. You

know, there were all kinds of Parcel Maps and there were ordinance changes and you know,

the regular business of the City is not on this list. This list is a to-do list and if... and we didn't do

anything about the Wireless Ordinance in the last year from last April. So, if we... unless we

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know, again I'm reviewing the Agendas from last year I couldn't find it and I kind of remember that one. Well, I always remember when the Wireless Ordinance come with us because it always has a unique dynamic to it, but in any event, I don't think it came to us in this last calendar year, and unless we know that it's coming and we have something to do in the next fiscal year, then let's drop it from here. We don't have to say we're interested, this is not a you know, these are things we think are important list. These are things that we know we have work to do in the next year on and so I think it's really up to Staff. If Staff is and it sounds like Director Lait has to check with Staff on this but we got a month before this comes back to us I think. If you find that this coming back in the following calendar year then let's keep it on because it will be part of what we do. But if we're not certain of that then it shouldn't be here and if it comes to us any way that's okay.

13 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Commissioner Reckdahl.

Commissioner Reckdahl: You mentioned this is a to-do list as opposed to a wish list and I generally agree. I think we should shorten this up as much as we can but we also talked earlier about well if it's something that we don't think we're going to be doing. We may want to put it in purgatory and put it at the back of the list and say this is not on our to-do list but it might be on our to-do list in 2-years. So, this would be something I think you would probably want to

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1 move to purgatory and say let's not forget about this but we don't anticipate doing this at all

2 this year.

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4 Chair Summa: Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang].

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6 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Can... I am in agreement, if we really don't think we're going to get to it we

7 shouldn't have it on the list. So yes, put it in purgatory, but I do want to... because we're talking

to Staff here and I know it's not totally in your control. Like 4-years if we really didn't address it

the last April to April cycle is too long to not update something when there's something where

there's really significant community interest. I thought we did have a session, a study session

during the year but I can't... you know, the years kind of blur.

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So, by taking it off it's not don't... Staff don't do it. It's still urgent but let's be realistic about just

14 the constraints that you're facing.

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Mr. Lait: Yep, understood, thank you, and it is important. We understand that and we know

that there're community members who are really focused in on this and would certainly like to

see us move forward on it. And so, we are aware of that and want to do what we can to quickly

move it forward. The... and there is work being done but it's just balancing it with the other

20 things that we have to do.

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2 I don't think the current ordinance is in any kind of critical state. The ruling that I think you

referenced didn't invalidate our ordinance. I think it enabled us to be more focused on some of

our Objective Aesthetic Standards than perhaps we are. So, there's an opportunity to

strengthen our ordinance and I think that's the goal that we're trying to achieve.

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7 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> I mean my understanding is that thinking that we might... thinking that the

judge... that the ruling might go the other way. We changed our ordinance and kind of like

relaxed some elements of it but we actually didn't need to. So, that means we took things out

that we didn't need to take out and they're still not back and I think that's what's got the

community so upset. Again, so not looking out for our own interests there so yeah.

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Mr. Lait: So, let's do this, let's... when we come back next month we'll have more of an update

for you on the wireless piece and regardless of whether it stays on the list or goes to purgatory

or elsewhere. It will be a priority that we'll be working on. It is something that's also on the

Council's list of things for us to do so.

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Chair Summa: Okay (interrupted)

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1 Commissioner Hechtman: So, I think we last talked about the Wireless Ordinance on January

2 12th, 2022 which I think was Vice-Chair Chang's first meeting perhaps, or no you joined in the

3 fall, right, right.

4

5 Commissioner Reckdahl: It was my first meeting, back when I had long hair.

6

7 <u>Chair Summa:</u> [unintelligible] Can you make copies of that binder for all of us? Commissioner

8 Templeton.

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10 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Thank you, so now that we're five in to our 18 unit long discussion. I

wonder if we want to revisit the process any because it feels like... I mean I don't feel like any of

us is droning on or anything but it seems like it's taking a long time. Is there any optimizations

13 that we could implement?

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Chair Summa: Yes, and thank you for the note. I noticed that it was taking a long time and I

think we... as much as we all like to delve deep into these topics and discuss when with each

other and Staff. I think we have to move a little quicker. We're not... none of these items are

agendized to discuss this evening. We're just trying to edit this list or potentially add to it and so

why don't we try and go a little faster? Just (interrupted)

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1	Commissioner Templeton: Maybe like a one-minute shot clock.
2	
3	Chair Summa: Because the time to really discuss these is when these individual things come
4	back to us as agenda items. Okay, where are we? Number Six, did is this already completed?
5	
6	Mr. Lait: Number Six, okay this no, I mean well, okay so this is a temporary yeah, we've done
7	that.
8	
9	Chair Summa: Yeah, I thought this was completed so we can for sure delete this one.
10	
11	Mr. Lait: Done. I mean it's a temporary moratorium so it's not done, it's just done for now.
12	
13	Chair Summa: So, I don't think we need any comment on an item we just deleted so let's move
14	on to Project Goal 7.
15	
16	Mr. Lait: This one we merged with two.
17	
18	Commissioner Hechtman: [off mic] Correct.
19	
20	Chair Summa: Yeah, so that's done, merged with two, okay. Goal 8, we've (interrupted)
	

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2 Mr. Lait: I can let know we're working on that plan and we're... I think I mentioned we're

3 coming back to you in the next couple months with some update.

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5 Chair Summa: Any comments from my colleagues? Commissioner Hechtman.

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7 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Yeah, just very briefly, because this one is reminding me so I don't

think we really have to do much to this. Other than you notice in the timeline section of Goal 8,

return to PTC later in 2022. So, I would like Staff to go top to bottom and because there are a

number of updates or just refinements. For example, up in the preamble, the Staff liaison has

Rachael's name from last year. So, let's update that, we have different Commissioners, prior

year accomplishments, and flowing through this I think we'll see some dates for 2022-23 that

need to be advanced. So, that's more of the just a clerical function that I wanted to make sure

that we catch [unintelligible] (interrupted)

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16 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you for that. Commissioner Templeton.

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18 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Thank you, I think three of the five of us at the very minimum are

pretty personally invested in this project. I'm wondering if we want to move it higher in the

20 rank maybe.

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1	Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, we got a study session coming up on May 8 th .
2	
3	Mr. Lait: May 8 th .
4	
5	Commissioner Hechtman: And then (interrupted)
6	
7	Mr. Lait: No, a public hearing.
8	
9	Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, oh sorry, a public hearing joint I meant a joint session, not a
10	study session, public hearing, and then in our next year there will be work to do on this as we
11	get certification and move forward with (interrupted)
12	
13	Mr. Lait: This year there'll be loads to do. We're going to be doing that concurrently and it's no
14	on this Work Plan but if we talk at the end about some things that might be coming down this
15	year. I have a short list on that as well.
16	
17	Chair Summa: So, to Commissioner Hechtman's point really we just keep this in as a broad item
18	the Housing Element and update.
19	
20	Commissioner Hechtman: Just kind of refresh what (interrupted)
	

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2	Chair Summa: Refresh the dates and whatnot.
3	
4	Commissioner Hechtman: Yep.
5	
6	Chair Summa: Any other comments? It's like okay we can move on to Goal 10.
7	
8	<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> [off mic] We've done this.
9	
10	<u>Chair Summa:</u> This I think this is done.
11	
12	Commissioner Hechtman: No, it's half done.
13	
14	Mr. Lait: That's right.
15	
16	Commissioner Hechtman: We did the bones but we've got to come back and do the meat.
17	
18	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay, that's right, you're right.
19	
20	Mr. Lait: And, you know (interrupted)

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4 Mr. Lait: We'll be... it's not a... these are administrative regulations too so we... I don't know

what we had communicated to the Commission before about your engagement in that. I do

know that we want to check in with the Architectural Review Board because there's design

related components.

8

9 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Right, so that's not necessarily something that would come to us, correct?

10

11 Mr. Lait: Yeah.

12

13 <u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> So, our portion is done.

14

15 Mr. Lait: It could be, yeah.

16

17 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Well, I'm hesitant to agree with that because I'm pretty sure the...

18 because we dealt with this recently and what we talked about was this is coming back... we

moved something out of the bones into the other part because it's coming back to us. So, I

don't want to wave it off in case it might but Staff can look at that, and if in fact, all that's left to

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do is the meat which is purely an ARB to Council, then we can take it off but if there is 1 2 something for us to do then just keep it on and keep it here and update it. 3 4 Chair Summa: I agree, keep it there and update it and any other comments? Okay, Number 11, 5 does the Director have comments on this one? 6 7 Ms. Star-Lack: I do. I think Staff would recommend combining all the parking items (interrupted) 8 9 Commissioner Hechtman: [off mic] Yes. 10 11 Ms. Star-Lack: Into a parking programs update. You (interrupted) 12 13 Commissioner Hechtman: 11, 12, 13 and 17. 14 15 Ms. Star-Lack: And 13. 16 Commissioner Hechtman: And 17 I think, that's... well that's Cal Avenue parking. Can that be 17 18 rolled in or do you want to keep it separate? 19

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1 Ms. Star-Lack: That... 17 would be... would have to come out of the Planning Department, not 2 from transportation. 3 4 Commissioner Hechtman: Ah okay, that's a good reason to keep it separate. 5 6 Ms. Star-Lack: But the... we are planning on bringing a parking programs to you next quarter, 7 fourth quarter of this fiscal year. So, I don't know if you want to keep this item on or you can 8 keep it on for the next work program... Work Plan if you'd like. 9 10 Chair Summa: I think combining them and keeping it on here is appropriate. Any other 11 comments? We're whipping through this now Commissioner Templeton. 12 13 <u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Yeah, let's (interrupted) 14 15 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> It's awesome, thank you for making that adjustment. 16 17 Chair Summa: Onto Goal 14, this is already done. Not... I mean there'll be changes to it at some 18 point but I don't know that we need to keep this on here. 19

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1	Ms. Star-Lack: It's [unintelligible] we will Office of Transportation is planning on bringing to
2	you at some point in late fiscal year 2024 a service evaluation of the on-demand transit
3	program. You can put it you can keep it or we'll bring it anyway, so I don't know that it needs
4	to be listed as a to-do for you but we would be bringing an evaluation of the first year of
5	service.
6	
7	Commissioner Hechtman: But late fiscal year '24, is that not the next cycle but the one after
8	that? We're about to hit '23-'24 so when you say late '24 I don't know if that means
9	(interrupted)
10	
11	Ms. Star-Lack: Sorry, I mean a year from now.
12	
13	<u>Commissioner Hechtman:</u> Okay [unintelligible – crosstalk](interrupted)
14	
15	Ms. Star-Lack: A little over a year from now.
16	
17	Commissioner Hechtman: So, I think it's appropriate to keep it if you're expecting to bring it to
18	us.
19	

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1	Commissioner Reckdahl: On Sunday at the Town Hall, Philip mentioned that your plan for more
2	grants to extend the hours.
3	
4	Ms. Star-Lack: Yes.
5	
6	Commissioner Reckdahl: And when would those come in? Is that soon or is that down the road?
7	
8	Ms. Star-Lack: We're constantly applying so I'm not sure. We did apply for a very large one,
9	hopefully, we'll hear within the next 3-months but I'm not sure.
10	
11	Commissioner Reckdahl: Thank you.
12	
13	<u>Chair Summa:</u> So, I think keep it and refresh it as Commissioner Hechtman says to reflect where
14	we're at. If there's no other comments, Project Goal 15, haven't done ADUs like 7,000 times?
15	
16	Commissioner Hechtman: Five.
17	
18	Chair Summa: Sorry, I exaggerated a little bit.
19	

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1	Mr. Lait: We'll probably be back next year with another State update to ADUs but we have
2	this one is done.
3	
4	Chair Summa: Can we take it off as a goal?
5	
6	<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Yes, please.
7	
8	Chair Summa: Alright, so we'll remove 15. Moving onto 16, well this would be for Ms. Star-Lack
9	but we are you are working on this, this year as you've already stated. So, I think we want to
10	keep this one and just have you refresh it.
11	
12	Ms. Star-Lack: Yes, the scope of work I believe includes three meetings with PTC.
13	
14	Chair Summa: Okay, comments? Commissioner Templeton.
15	
16	Commissioner Templeton: Yes, I agree we should keep it. If we were to be more specific here I
17	would love to work on understanding I assume that this would be a part of the presentation.
18	Understanding where deadly collisions have happened and seeing if there's anything that we
19	can do to improve it within some timeframe.
20	
	

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1 Ms. Star-Lack: I just want to... I want to clarify, so the Bike Plan will absolutely contain a crash 2 analysis and I mean every Bike Plan does. So, that will happen but I also just going to back to 3 the other item, the federal grant. That also will include a crash analysis and really set the tone for I think a robust program of work around traffic safety that I think you want. 4 5 6 Commissioner Templeton: That's awesome. 7 8 Ms. Star-Lack: And so that's why I'm really excited about this federal grant. I just have to make 9 it happen but I think we'll (interrupted) 10 11 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Anything we can do to help, let us know. 12 13 Ms. Star-Lack: It will lay out... yeah, I need to get it going so. 14 15 <u>Commissioner Templeton:</u> Thank you, this is great, thank you. 16 17 Chair Summa: Commissioner Reckdahl. 18

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- 1 Commissioner Reckdahl: Yeah, there's been interest in a Seal crossing to go under or over the
- 2 railroad tracks at around Seal Avenue. What's the status? Is that being worked at all? Is that...
- 3 do you see that in the future or is that still just kind of a pipe dream?

- 5 Ms. Star-Lack: So, that's... that is... Council asked us to include the consideration of that kind of
- 6 as part of the grade separation considerations. Include that consideration into the Bike Plan
- 7 update, so that will happen as part of a whole network analysis about where should crossings
- 8 occur from a network connectivity perspective.

9

10 <u>Commissioner Reckdahl:</u> Very good, thank you.

11

12 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Any other comments? Okay, Goal 17.

13

- 14 Mr. Lait: So, this is one that I'd recommend pulling off of the Work Plan. We've identified for
- the City Council that this is not an item that we are going to pursue that this point. And not
- because we're being obstinate but because of the reason this was put into place was to find an
- 17 opportunity for more businesses, restaurants in particular, to be established on California
- 18 Avenue. Where right now because of the parking standards they're not able to take over a
- 19 previous retail space because the parking standards are too great.

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1	AB 2097 effectively eliminates the need for this program because now a restaurant owner who
2	would want to take over a retail space on California Avenue could do so without having to
3	provide parking.
4	
5	Chair Summa: Oh, that's a good point because this has been a concern of mine for years, 7-
6	years now because it was actually keeping businesses from moving in because of the prior
7	parking restrictions. So, that's great that we don't have to worry about that. It's a silver lining
8	perhaps.
9	
10	Commissioner Reckdahl: What was that? That was 2097?
11	
12	Mr. Lait: AB 2097.
13	
14	Commissioner Reckdahl: And what can you give a quick summary?
15	
16	Mr. Lait: Yeah and I'll invite Albert Yang to join me if I don't quite get this right but this is the
17	one that I referenced earlier where if you are for properties located within a half a mile of
18	(interrupted)
19	
20	Commissioner Reckdahl: Oh, it's a half mile.

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- 2 Mr. Lait: Caltrain, rapid... that's not the right... that's not the term. They don't say Caltrain in the
- 3 State Law but that's the one that's locally appropriate for us. Within a half mile of that point
- 4 development projects for housing projects and for commercial projects, there's a zero parking
- 5 requirement the State has stipulated except for hotels and I think one other exemption.

7 <u>Chair Summa:</u> But if they're not redeveloped?

8

9 Mr. Lait: If they get a Building Permit for a tenant improvement.

10

11 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay so even an Occupancy Permit would count?

12

- Mr. Lait: Well, so if you're doing a restaurant, you're probably going to do a... you're going to
- 14 need to put in stuff that's going to require a Building Permit, and that Building Permit process,
- as I understand it, qualifies as being subject to that provision. But let me ask Mr. Yang to join us,
- 16 I see he's got his camera on.

17

18 <u>Chair Summa:</u> It's kind of a nuance, you know?

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1 Mr. Albert Yang, City Attorney: I don't have much to add to what Director Lait said, but on that

2 specific issue the State Law says that it applies to any development project and it doesn't define

3 what a development project is. But there are... at least this particular bill doesn't define what it

4 means in this context. But there are a couple of definitions elsewhere in the Government Code

that suggest that any time you're getting a Building Permit that's what... that's a development

6 project.

7

8 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Thank you for that, so the case... the real case we had where the little... the copy

shop was the... had the lowest requirement because of the different parking structure on Cal

Ave and a yogurt store couldn't move in because take out food has the highest. That won't

happen anymore because of this?

Mr. Lait: There... we would not... there's no parking requirement within a half mile.

Chair Summa: Okay, so a simple permit to... because if they don't need a Building Permit, they

would maybe still need to... I guess not? I mean I'm just... does a certificate... if all they need to

move in and operate their legal use business is a Certificate of Occupancy. Would it solve a

18	Vice-Chair Chang: Right that was not next question, is there stuff that's not on here that we
19	think should be? So, that right.

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1 Chair Summa: Commissioner Hechtman. 2 3 Commissioner Hechtman: So, the note that I made to myself, the thing that we had talked 4 about at the same meeting we had the elections of officers is we need to update our By-Laws to 5 address that issue and so I think that should be on our Work Plan for this coming year. 6 7 Chair Summa: That's good idea, so let's add that as the new number 11 or 12 I guess. So, 8 update our By-Laws to be in consistent with BCC Handbook and are there any other additions? 9 10 Mr. Lait: [unintelligible – off mic] 11 12 Vice-Chair Chang: Yes, we're asking Staff as well. 13 14 Mr. Lait: Okay because we each have a shortlist. Sylvia? 15 Ms. Star-Lack: Thank you, thanks, and some of this can get put into a traffic safety item if you 16 prefer. Staff would like to bring forward the Crescent Park Traffic Calming Project that's been 17 18 ongoing and so that's an item and the quiet zone, the Caltrain quiet zones might be something 19 you would want to include. Another is, maybe rises to this level or not, but a bicycle Muni Code Cleanup. There's a lot of arcane language in our Muni Code. 20

2	Commissioner Hechtman: And then the Crescent Park issue, Number One which is the traffic
3	safety issue which we're not broadening to just be more comprehensive. That one should be
4	able to fit in there as an example of the thing you'll bring us. I don't know if the Caltrain quiet
5	zone really fits in there because that's not so much a safety issue is it, as a neighborhood?
6	
7	Ms. Star-Lack: You could (interrupted)
8	
9	Chair Summa: Well, I mean (interrupted)
10	
11	Commissioner Hechtman: Is it a safety issue?
12	
13	Chair Summa: In the sense, I think well, I should let Ms. Star-Lack answer but in the sense that
14	you have to beef up the safety significantly if you don't have the horns.

16	Ms. Star-Lack: Right.

18	Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, so let's fold that as another example in traffic safety.

20	Ms. Star-Lack: Okay.

4 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Yeah, to the extent they can be folded in together, that it makes sense I agree

5 with that. Commissioner Templeton.

<u>Chair Summa:</u> Okay, other comments from Staff or colleagues?

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12 Mr. Lait: I got a couple more items and I think this could probably go on the refreshed Housing

13 Element bucket but just so that you have some awareness. We will be coming back to you with

some zoning changes to implement key components of the Housing Element that relate to...

that we are relying on to achieve our RHNA numbers. And so that's going to be upzoning some

of the multi-family zones and the GM ROLM areas. There's going to be... we have these carry-

over sites where we need to allow for by-right development if they provide... if a developer

provides 20 percent inclusionary. There are three I believe Stanford... three or four Stanford-

owned properties that we had committed to making changes to our zoning to allow for greater

Coolings which are supposed

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1 housing development in those locations. So, those are sort of RHNA... those we have to get

done and I believed we're targeting to have that done this year.

4 And then another component which we're going to try to fold into this process but is not

necessarily subject to the RHNA component is the Housing Element Incentive Program. This is

expanding... these are all programs that are in the Housing Element and so those will be coming

7 to you.

9 So, is that appropriate to fold that into a refreshed, okay, Housing Element bucket?

11 <u>Chair Summa:</u> Yeah, into Goal 9 I guess we would put it there. Yeah, that would be very helpful.

13 Mr. Lait: Great and then another is renter protection... let's see, rental... the Rental Registry is

something that we are actively working on. I mentioned the workshop on March 30th. There's

15 going to be I believe a check-in with the Commission on that just so that you have some

awareness. I don't know that there's a... I'm trying to think. I don't believe there's a Title 18

implication so there may not be any formal action of the Commission but we want to check in

since your... this body's obviously involved in housing-related issues. We want to get your input

19 on that program.

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1	Chair Summa: So, that would be a new goal (interrupted)

5	Chair Summa: Because I don't think we have anything that pertains to that. Commissioner

19	us in any way because we're going to get what we're going to get. But if people feel strongly

had a lively... I'm thinking it was a few years ago but we had a really lively discussion about

4 what the Rental Registry meant and I think it means more than it seems like on the surface. It

would be really valuable for the City, for the renters and other reasons. So, I think... I would love

to prioritize that or add it as a special project goal. Thank you.

regulations for developments related to bird-safe glass in the City as well as some regulations to

address uplighting and this dark skies initiative. So, that we don't have... to minimize light

but we are wanting to get done, you know, initiate this year and would likely involve PTC

18	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Great, Commissioner Chang [note – Vice-Chair Chang] and then Commissioner
19	Hechtman.

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1	<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Did Council by any chance ask Staff to update the Streamside Ordinance as
2	well? Like the 20-feet, 150-feet which is also in our Comp Plan but was isn't in our legislation.
3	
4	Mr. Lait: Yes (interrupted)
5	
6	<u>Vice-Chair Chang:</u> Good.
7	
8	Mr. Lait: And it was the next one I was going to say.
9	
10	Vice-Chair Chang: [unintelligible], yah!

12	Mr. Lait: Again, optimistically we are currently un-resourced for it but I want to see if there's
13	some consultants that can help us to move that along.

15	Chair Summa: Commissioner Hechtman, your?

17	Commissioner Hechtman: Oh, yeah, no I'm fine with adding both of these things which I think
18	brings us, in my count, to 15 plus one in purgatory.
19	

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1	<u>Chair Summa:</u> Is that the end of your list? Any other comments from colleagues? Then as long
2	as you feel you've got enough direction I think we're done here. Oh, Commissioner Hechtman?
3	
4	Commissioner Hechtman: Yeah, [unintelligible - crosstalk] a question, so I and maybe I'm
5	remembering our Handbook but we went through a process last year when Ed Lauing was our
6	Chair. And I thought it was the Work Plan but maybe it was I thought it was the Work Plan, I

You 10 know, information for tenants or if you want information about development projects, housing 11 projects, if you want information on ADUs. All the information that we're complying is to be in 12 one location from housing services to production to if you're an affordable housing provider 13 you can get information about all that stuff. I'll acknowledge that there's... you know this is an 14 evolution, that new content will be added but we've got the framework for it and I hope to be 15 able to publish information frequently on that website. That deals with... that addresses... it has that chart, that RHNA chart of what we're trying to do and how many units we've produced. So 16 17 that people can just go to a website and check that out. That may not be available at the outset 18 of its launch which I think is happening in the next couple of weeks, but we will add that feature 19 on. So, that people can have a sense for where we are and what's in the queue, pending,

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approved, under permit, things like that.

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2 Commissioner Reckdahl: Okay, that'd be awesome. Okay, thank you.

Commissioner Templeton: Thank you so much. Tagging along on Commissioner Reckdahl's questions, I think you are being really kind in saying that these are nice-to-haves. I don't think they're nice to haves, I think every time we have a Planning Commission meeting and we have a Staff Report. We should have one from transportation that includes collisions that they are aware, whether or not police is cooperating or sending enough heads-up information when collisions happen. That sounds like an internal process but know that we support you and we will do what we can whenever it's agendized to help you get the support you need to get that

I think the awareness of collisions is pretty minimal around here. We hear a few, there's many, many more. There's also many that go under-reported, unreported because the students are experiencing a collision but get up and walk away from it. So, I want to encourage you to also consider whenever it's appropriate and if it needs to be agendized let us know but you know, the 311 app is in their hands. They could easily report and say I experienced a collision here with a map app and they could drop a pin and then you'd have more real-time data. You
